

Fort Sheridan to Stage Big Show Army Day, April 8

Twenty-three hundred soldiers will march in review before the Commanding General of the VI Corps Area and the Army Day visitors on Saturday afternoon, April 8th, at Fort Sheridan. Army Day is the anniversary of our entry in the World War. It is the occasion for test mobilizations, military parades and exhibitions. The Army wants to do more than announce—it wants to impress you that it is your Army. This Day at Fort Sheridan will afford you the opportunity of observing the land forces which form the nation's first line of defense.

Private First Class Richard Gieras, 2nd Infantry, and Private John Gimson, 14th Cavalry, will be honored at this event. The War Department, through Major General Stanley H. Ford, will award these young men the Soldier's Medal. By personal and heroic action, they saved the lives of two civilians near Fort Sheridan last fall.

Brigadier General Karl Truesdale, Commanding General, Fort Sheridan, has arranged this Army Day exhibition for Saturday afternoon, April 8th, as a special convenience to the people of Chicago. Although by radio and press and on other posts, the day will be observed officially April 6th, Fort Sheridan is holding the exhibition for your convenience on Saturday afternoon, April 8th.

The Fort Sheridan Reservation has 700 acres. It is populated by four units of the Regular Army. Fort Sheridan is the only post in the United States at which one can find represented the four main fighting branches of our Army. Here we find the 2nd Infantry, or the foot troops, better known as doughboys. This branch is called the "Queen of Battles." The 14th Cavalry provides two troops of roughriders. Their tradition comes from the days of the Indian wars. The 63rd Field Artillery, composed of three Batteries of three inch guns gives another interesting view of the complex character of the modern military machine. Anti-aircraft units of the 51st Coast Artillery complete the picture of this scheme of self-defense.

A men's garden club of Highland Park, affiliated with the Men's Garden Clubs of America, is being organized.

The objects of the club shall be to devote its energies to the promotion and appreciation of horticulture, to promote the adoption of higher garden standards in the community, to develop and promote interest in civic garden activities, parks, community plantings, and the conservation of native vegetation.

Cooperation with all organizations interested in horticulture is, of course, a part of the aims.

Affiliation with the national organization will make available lists of speakers, pictures on garden subjects, developments of interest in all phases of gardening to the amateur.

A little history might, perhaps, be of interest in that the national

organization was formed in 1923 by the representatives of four clubs, and that at the present time they have grown to twenty-four affiliated clubs, covering a great part of the country from New York to Oregon, and from Illinois to Louisiana.

It is planned to hold meetings once a month to hear garden subjects discussed by nationally known authorities, and to pursue programs which would be of mutual interest to all amateur gardeners.

For the purpose of organization, a charter membership roll in which you are invited to participate will be prepared. This group will attempt to formulate the various activities and policies of the club.

Serves six. 3 cups flour - 1/2 teaspoon salt - 3 teaspoons baking powder - 3 tablespoons sugar - 1 egg, beaten - 1 cup milk - 4 tablespoons melted butter or substitute - 1 cup Little America blueberries. Method: Sift and measure the flour. Add the salt, baking powder and sugar. Sift again. Combine the beaten egg, milk and fat, and add to the dry ingredients. Mix only enough to dampen the flour. Fold in the Little America blueberries carefully. Drop into greased muffin pans. Bake in an oven, 400 degrees F., for 20 minutes.
