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# FRANK J. ROMAN PRESENTS AN EIGHTEEN POINT PROGRAM OF CIVIC BETTERMENT

"ELECT THE MAN WITH A PLAN"

Check this platform against our city's needs

1. Economy

The keystone of my administration shall be ECONOMY. I am opposed to tax increases. I shall work for tax reductions.

### 2. Business Administration

Managing the affairs of a city is no different from managing a business. It is my avowed intention to provide a business administration.

3. Cut Costs

I shall insist upon a central buying department which can secure advantageous prices through quantity buying. Present "hit and miss" buying by many unsupervised individuals will thus be eliminated.

4. Stop Equipment Waste

One of my economy measures shall be the pooling of cityowned equipment. I believe equipment should be used where and when needed, regardless of the department to which it is primarily assigned.

5. Solve the Garbage Question

I most emphatically favor an immediate and practical solution of the garbage problem within the limits of our budget. The program devised must deal adequately, not only with collection, but also with incinerator and dumps.

Meet Sanitation Needs

The present health and sanitation program of Highland Park is woefully inadequate. I propose to make health protection one of the major efforts of my administration.

7. Make Our City Safe

It is my intention to initiate an aggressive safety program. I shall seek better protection for our citizens at grade and street crossings; and special attention will be paid to safety for school children.

**Promote Highland Park** 

propose a program of hearty co-operation on the part of city officials and civic bodies, such as the Chamber of Commerce, in an effort to make Highland Park a still more important and attractive business and shopping center.

9. Protect the Public

The traditional efficiency of our police and fire departments must be maintained. I propose to work with the present heads of these departments in an earnest effort to accomplish this result.

10. Bring City Laws Up-to-Date

The ordinances of our city must be modernized. City employees and the public have for years been confused by conflicting and obsolete regulations. Our city ordinances have not been re-codified since 1919. I propose prompt, simple, and adequate revision.

11. Work Together for Results

One-man government is not good government. A well-run business succeeds only by utilizing man power. I shall apply this principle to the affairs of the city and seek the utmost in co-operation and counsel from each Commissioner, from every city employee, and from interested citizens.

Draft Ability

The greatest asset which our city has is its able citizens. propose to utilize this asset by appointing qualified men and women to serve on various boards and commissions that will deal with such problems as city planning, recreation, flood control, mosquito abatement, weed elimination, and lake front safety.

13. Eliminate Voting Confusion

The constant changing of polling places is a source of confusion and inconvenience to voters. I shall vigorously support any reasonable plan of simplified voting procedure.

14. Consult Experts

I propose to consult with the members of all present boards and commissions and make sure that all such bodies are constituted so that they will function for the good of the city as a whole.

15. Invite Public Opinion

Regular attendance of Highland Park citizens at meetings of the City Commission will benefit all parties concerned. propose to urge such attendance.

16. Report to Citizens

propose an annual printed report to citizens. This will tell our people in simple language where their money goes and why. Also, it will review the activities of all city departments.

Keep Regular Hours

My avowed intention is to be a full-time Mayor. I shall establish and announce regular office hours, and I shall be available to the citizens of Highland Park during those hours.

18. Give Everyone a Square Deal

Every resource at my command will be dedicated to the service of our city as a whole, and not to the service of any individual, group, or section.
