In regard to his civic activities, Mr. Nelson has been identified with the Community Chest drives and has been for twenty years President of Sunset Valley (Municipal) Golf Club.

Due to his successful career in business and to his active participation in the affairs of the community, Mr. Nelson feels himself qualified for the office he seeks.

Robert C. L. Price was born in St. Louis, Missouri, in 1904. He received his elementary and part of his high school education in the public schools in that city. The last two years of high school and the first two years of college were completed at Principia, in St. Louis. In 1924 he entered the School of Business at Northwestern university in Evanston and in 1926 was graduated from that institution, obtaining the degree of Bachelor of Science. In 1928 he commenced the study of law at Chicago Kent College of Law and in 1932 he received an LL.B. degree from that institution. The same year he took the Illinois bar examination and was admitted to the practice of law.

During the period he was attending high school and the first two years of college, he spent the majority of his vacations working in St. Louis banks. During his summer vacation between his junior and senior years in Northwestern university he obtained a sales position with Consumers Company of Chicago. Upon graduation the following year he was employed by the Consumers company in their sales department and remained with that company until shortly after he commenced the study of law at night. During the period he attended law school and up to the time he was admitted to the practice of law he was engaged in the insurance business in Chicago. Since being admitted to the bar, he has been continuously engaged in the general practice of law in this state. He has appeared, by special motions, before the court in Missouri and before the French Tribunal. He is associated with the law firm of Ditchburne and Lounsbury, in Chicago. Recently he was appointed Assistant States Attorney of Lake county to handle special matters.

Mr. Price is a member of Sigma

Alpha Epsilon, a national social fraternity, and Phi Delta Phi, a legal fraternity. He has been the secretary and a director of the Northwestern University club of Chicago, and for one year a director of the Men's Fellowship Club of Highland Park. He has been active and a member of the Cub Scout Committee in Ravinia and has participated in Highland Park Community Chest drives and has attended and been interested in Township P.T.A. meetings.

In 1926, Mr. Price married Olivia Fisher, daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Hugo Fisher of Sycamore place. His household in addition to Mrs. Price consists of one son, Robby, and a nephew, Billy Price. For the past five years he has lived at 1334 Judson avenue, in Ravinia, and has resided in Highland Park permanently since 1931.

This is the first time Mr. Price has entered the political field. He states: "He is committed to the proposition that a person accepting public office is charged with a public trust and that it is his intention, if elected, to perform his duties in an efficient and conscientious manner." He believes that his experience in the business and legal field qualifies him for the City Council and he feels that the application of his training will be beneficial to the welfare of this community.

Nathan S. Sharp was born on August 16, 1893, at Waterloo, Iowa, of Scotch-English parentage. He attended Waterloo public schools and Northwestern university and University of North Carolina.

In June 1917 he enlisted and attended the First Officers' Training Camp at Plattsburgh, New York. He was commissioned as Second Lieutenant, Field Artillery, in November of the same year, and served continuously until February 1919.

Upon his discharge from the army he resumed his career in the investment banking business where he has specialized in municipal finance. He has been the resident manager of the Chicago offices of R. W. Pressprich & Co. for several years.

Mr. Sharp moved to Highland Park in March 1932 and made his home at 2420 North Deere Park drive until the time of his marriage when he built the house in which he now resides at 791 Oak Grove avenue, in Hield's Braeside subdivision.

He has never been engaged in political affairs, and has never held nor sought political office. He was petitioned to run for City Commissioner by a number of citizens, and was nominated by 2120 votes at the February 28 primaries. His broad

business experience would prove a valuable asset in the efficient administration of our city government.

Mr. Sharp has been active in many Highland Park civic affairs, especially those of the Braeside Civic Association.

Arthur Swanson was born in Highwood, Ill., on Jan. 3, 1895. He received his primary education in the Highwood school and then attended Deerfield Shields Township High school, now known as Highland Park High school.

From 1912 to 1917 he was engaged in learning the plumbing business.

In May 1917, just after the United States entered the World War, he joined the navy serving on the U.S.S. Bushnell submarine tender. He received an honorable discharge from the navy in February 1919. From that date until 1921 Mr. Swanson was employed as a plumber in loop buildings by a Chicago concern. Until 1922 he was engaged in selling plumbing supplies in northern Illinois for the Standard Sanitary Mfg. Co. For the next seven years he worked as a foreman for a plumbing contractor in Winnetka and in 1929 he founded his own business at 386 Central avenue in Highland Park.

In regard to his civic activities, in 1932 Mr. Swanson was elected Justice to the Peace for Deerfield Township. However, in 1934 he resigned this position and was appointed Assistant Supervisor of the County Board. At present he is a member of the Board of School District 107, committeeman of Boy Scout Troop No. 324 and a member of the Community Service.

Garments Destroyed By Fire Tuesday At Ermine Cleaners

Easter Sunday will be a rather drab time for many patrons of the Ermine Cleaners, whose garments were being refreshed for the spring season, for fire of an unknown origin destroyed several hundreds of dollars worth of clothing Tuesday afternoon.

The fire which broke out shortly after 3 o'clock was discovered by an employee in the shipping room where the garments were awaiting delivery. Fireproof walls kept it from spreading to the cleaning room and to the garage.

The greater proportion of the garments destroyed were men's suits.

It is believed the fire started between the shipping room and the waiting room where a lattice partition divided the room. There were 500 suit bags hanging from the rack when the fire broke out. Both Highwood and Highland Park fire departments responded to the call. The total loss had not been estimated, but it is believed to be about \$25,000. Only slight damage was done to the building.
