H. F. Siemsen AFTER EASTER - WHAT? "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations" Matt. 28:19, Read Acts 1:1-8.

Last Sunday all of our churches were filled to overflowing, in some instances people went home because the seats were all taken, but now that Easter is over what will happen in the weeks and months that are before us? The first Easter was not the end but the beginning of the Christian movement. The peril of our day is that we allow the experiences of Lent to reach a great climax on Easter and then end in the celebration. Too often our efforts of Lent are followed by a slackening of effort and by a toning down of our enthusiasm.

WHO IS MY OPPONENT FOR MAYOR?
