VILLAGE- ELECTION

Deerfield will elect three village trustees and a police magistrate on Tuesday, April 18. There are nine candidates seeking the trusteeships and three candidates for the office of police magistrate. The Better Government ticket contains the following three for trustees: Homer G. Cazel, Jirah D. Cole Jr., and Edward B. Crush; and Dan Hunt for police magistrate. 


