VILLAGE ELECTION

Deerfield will elect three village trustees and a police magistrate on Tuesday, April 18. There are nine candidates seeking the trusteeships and three candidates for the office of police magistrate. The Better Government ticket contains the following three for trustees: Homer G. Casel, Jirah D. Cole Jr., and Edward B. Crush; and Dan Hunt for police magistrate. The Citizens ticket has for its three trustees: Oliver F. Burnett Jr., Lawrence Fry and Harry Stuppel; and for police magistrate, Raymond Meyer. The third ticket is the People's ticket and those seeking the trusteeships are: William Hertel, W. W. Stem Sr., and Russell Potterton; and for police magistrate, Raymond Clavey.

Voters will also mark their ballots on a proposition to increase the village levy 8 1/2 hundredths of one per centum for general corporate purposes for a period of four years.

At the Wilmot school Ben Siljestrom was unopposed and received 22 votes for director of the three member boards and the Bannockburn residents re-elected Edward R. Seese to the grammar school board of directors. Mr. Seese is also a member of the high school board of education.

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
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
