Deerfield Stagers to Present 'April 28' 'The Enchanted April'

"The Enchanted April," a comedy by Kane Campbell, will be presented Friday, April 28, by the "Stagers" of the Deerfield Presbyterian church at 8:20 p.m. in the Deerfield Grammar school auditorium.

The play is the last of the current season, and will close it with a promise of an even more successful season next fall.

Most of the action of "The Enchanted April" takes place in a castle on the Mediterranean shores in Italy. Four women, for different reasons, to get away from their usual routine of life, rent this castle for the month of April, when the romance and beauty of Italy is most dazzling. When husbands and suitors arrive, some unexpectedly, commotion turns into hilarious comedy with witty and clever dialog.

The four women escaping to Italy for April are played by Geneva Ritter, as Mrs. Lotty Wilkins, a dutiful wife, but an enthusiastic and bubbling personality; Shirley Clark, as Mrs. Fisher, the "last of the Victorians;" Josephine Schessler plays Mrs. Rose Arbuthnot, a neglected lonely wife of a famous author; and Mary Jane Galloway is the socially bored young aristocrat, Lady Caroline Dester.

Aubrey Gould takes the role of Thomas Watley Briggs, owner of the castle, and a struggling young artist. Jack Covington plays the role of a correct and cautious solicitor, the husband of Lotty Wilkins, Mel-lersh Wilkins. John Derby is Ferdinand Arundel, nom de plume of Fredrick Arbuthnot, who is Rose's husband, and is a famous author.

The Italian maid and caretaker at the castle are characterized by Martha Jordan and Anthony Mercurio as Francesca and Domenico, respectively. The part of the clerk at the Woman's club in London is played by Helen Galloway.

A very competent "backstage" crew is working hard on a beautiful setting for this play, and their work with that of an able cast of players directed by Kenneth Hunter, will result in one of the "Stagers" best productions. Highwood Auxiliary Centers Interest on Child Welfare Work

Interest of the American Legion Auxiliary's one-half million members is being centered on the welfare of the American children during April, according to Mrs. John Doull, Child Welfare Chairman of Stupey-Smith Unit of the Auxiliary of Highwood. April is Child Welfare Month in the Auxiliary's calendar of activities, when special emphasis is given to the organization's child welfare work and when plans are developed for the year's efforts in behalf of needy children.

The Auxiliary's efforts are being centered on three subjects this year, explained Mrs. Doull:

1. Conservation of the child's own home for the child, through improved use of the aid to dependent children under the Social Security Act.
2. Eradication of congenial syphilis, through proper medical tests and treatment of expectant mothers.
3. Prevention of contagious diseases to assure child health, through development of preventative medical practice as outlined in the "Indiana plan."

The American Legion is working jointly with the Legion Auxiliary in this program, which is being extended throughout the nation. Interest and cooperation of other organizations is being sought. Medical men, within and without the Legion, are giving their help in many communities.

"It is clearly understood that the

program for April goes far beyond the confines of the thirty days of this month," said Mrs. M. K. Robertson, National Child Welfare Chairman. "It is our job in the weeks that are to come to do all in our power to follow through on this three-phase program. Merely to believe that a child's home should be preserved for him, only to acknowledge that expectant mothers should have pre-natal examination for syphilis and treatment if blood tests are positive, simply to think that contagious diseases should be controlled is not enough. We must secure definite data and reliable information; we must spread the gospel; we must secure the cooperation of individuals and groups, and actuate our beliefs promptly and intelligently."
