With Joan Bennett, Randolph Scott and May Robson playing the chief roles at the head of a cast of hundreds, "The Texans" tells of the experiences of a southern family caught in the whirlpool of post-war years. Miss Bennett, as a spitfire girl of old Dixie, personifies the "unreconciled rebel," who refuses to admit that the "great cause" is lost, while Scott, her romantic partner, is the homecoming soldier who sees that the only hope for Texas is to forget the past and rebuild its prosperity on a new basis.

Charles A. Harbaugh Prominent Citizen Dies in Florida

News of the death of Charles Harbaugh, prominent lumber dealer, who has been a resident of Highland Park since 1908, came as a great shock to the citizens of this community. He passed away early Sunday morning at St. Petersburg, Fla., where he had been spending several months.

Mr. Harbaugh, who was 74 years old, was born in Liberty Corners, Wis., July 11, 1865. Twenty years later he established the Charles Harbaugh Lumber company at Lake Villa, Ill. In 1909 he opened his main office in Highland Park with yards located at Fox Lake, Round Lake and St. Charles.

On February 23, 1889, he married Miss Florence Bremmer of Springfield, Wis. Mrs. Harbaugh passed away April 2, 1935.

Mr. Harbaugh was interested in all civic affairs, and served the county as a supervisor for several years.

He was a member of the Presbyterian church, serving as trustee and treasurer for a period of four years, and in various other capacities, had been active since 1911.

A charter member of the Highland Park Rotary club, he served efficiently as its secretary for many years. At the time of his retirement from active business, he was (Continued on Page 7)

Herman N. Schwery Passes Away Sunday

Herman N. Schwery, 58 former Highland Park justice of the peace, died Sunday in the Highland Park Hospital after a long illness resulting from a heart ailment. Mr. Schwery, a sheet metal contractor served as a Deerfield township justice of the peace for eight years as a police magistrate from 1911 to 1935. The family home is at 514 1/2 Laurel Avenue.

Born in Highland Park May 3, 1881, he later moved to Waukegan and returned to Highland Park about 30 years ago. Surviving Mr. Schwery are his wife, Birdella, a daughter, Frances and two sisters, Mrs. Charles Raasch and Mrs. Peter Franz, both of Waukegan.

RONAN ELECTED MAYOR BY A LARGE MAJORITY

Bowes, Swanson, Sharp and Gourley Chosen Commissioners For Next Four Years

Swept into office by a large percentage of votes in all precincts with the exception of precincts 9, 10 and 11, Frank J. Ronan was elected Mayor of the City of Highland Park in Tuesday's election.

Jerome P. Bowes, Arthur Swanson, N. S. Sharp and A. Lyle Gourley were the candidates elected to



the primary election were also high men in the general election, Bowes running first with 3,788; Swanson second with 3,633 and Sharp with 3,008. Gourley who scored the fifth highest vote at the primaries, was fourth in the election Tuesday, with 2,927 votes.

Daniel J. Davitt who was eliminated in the primary election with a low vote of 753, but became a candidate when William J. Brown, passed away, suddenly, a week preceding the election, ran a close fifth with a vote of 2,153, in the finals.

Henry Hanson polled a larger vote for the office of Police magistrate than did either of the candidates for mayor. He received 4,187 votes against Gerritt T. Thorne's 1,496.
