Ham Croquettes

Chop fine 1 cup of ham cut from the shank of a Certified Tender Made Ham. Combine with 1 cup cold lamb or chicken, also chopped fine. Season with salt, cayenne, 16 teaspoon celery salt, 1 teaspoon minced onion and 1 teaspoon finely chopped parsley. Bind together with 1 cup thick white sauce and shape into croquettes. Dip in dried bread crumbs, then in beaten egg and again in crumbs.
