### Rotary Club Hears Interesting Report on German Conditions

After spending nine months in Germany, Attorney Robert Spengler returned to the United States and spoke before the Highland Park Rotary club on Monday, April 24. His family are active in Nazi circles and his address gave the reactions of an American lawyer to the things which he saw and the procedure in the Reich. He told why the extreme regimentation was irksome and unattractive to American people but seemed to satisfy the German nation. His observations included manufacturing conditions, laboring conditions, standards of living, supply of food, military preparedness, the educational system of a Nazi as applied to the younger generation.

Mr. Spengler returned to Germany as the land of his birth, believing that he would not return to the United States. His conclusion was that it was better to enjoy freedom here than to live under the oppressive system and have material wants supplied. While there may be an undercurrent against Hitler, the majority of the people are either satisfied to accept his government or heartily approve it. There is, however, a growing dissatisfaction which is not powerful enough to make itself manifest at the present time.

One of the most astonishing things reported was the control exercised over young boys by members of the political party in power. The correction, supervision and punishment of children has been taken away from their parents and vested in the political arm of the state. This has produced an extreme degree of arrogance and intolerance in the younger generation.

Mr. Spengler was introduced by Ben Ball of the High school faculty. He answered questions freely from the audience in relation to the difference between the Hitler youths and our Boy Scouts, the coercion that was exercised upon the individual, and how the people of Germany regarded the people of the United States. Among the amusing incidents he related the attitude of the people towards clothing made out of wood fiber and the jokes that are passed sub rosa against the administration in power. He also told about numerous tag days that are held for various alleged benefits and the extreme thrift of the people. He was asked about concentration camps but could only report his hearsay information received from some of the occupants of the camps on their trip as emigrants across the ocean.
