HVALE FORGE

The inside of the Hvale Forge work shop is pictured in the Christian Science Monitor issue of April 8, showing Leander Hvale and his son, James, at work. Pictured also is the local blacksmith, Peter Kamminga, who has his shop with the Hvales. A very attractive weather-vane, a fire screen, and an estate sign, are shown in detail. Under the caption "Art Finds Expression in Wrought Iron" is the interesting story of the origin of the forge. The first shop was in their home, but now it is a regular shop opposite the Deerfield depot.

COMMUNITY CENTER

The Deerfield Community Center, in the store at the north east corner of Deerfield and Waukegan roads is now completed and the doors are open to all. The attractive sign in silhouette over the door is the artistic work of the Hvale Forge and designed by James Hvale to represent Deerfield. The panorama of the sign shows the deer, trees, the church, the school, homes and the business district in black against the white building.

Evergreen trees in blue pots stand on either side of the doorway and blue awnings shade the large windows. Inside are lovely window draperies, comfortable davenport, chairs, telephone and soft rugs to make the room a restful place where visitors may meet a friend, or rest after a tour of the shopping district. Travelers stopping in the village come in to make inquiry and to learn more of the hospitality of Deerfield. The street guide printed by Dan Hunt has a very definite place in helping to

direct the inquirers to the right destination within the village.
