Orphans of the Storm is incorporated and Mrs. McLaughlin is its treasurer having served in this capacity for 11 years. She has worked hard to keep it open, but she disclaims ownership saying it is not a private hobby but a public institution doing a worthwhile and necessary work, which should in part at least be supported by the Community Fund.

Describe Classes of Competition in Archery Tournament

Two weeks ago the Community Service of Highland Park announced a communitywide Archery Tournament. This tournament is to be held on Sunday afternoon May 21. This news article describes the various classes of competition. There are to be four classes of competition:

(1) Men's American Round, which consists of shooting 30 arrows at 60 yards; 30 arrows at 50 yards; and 30 arrows at 40 yards.

(2) Women's Columbian Round, which consists of shooting 24 arrows at 50 yards; 24 arrows at 40 yards; and 24 arrows at 30 yards.

(3) For boys there is the Junior American Round, consisting of 30 arrows shot at 50 yards; 30 arrows shot at 40 yards; and 30 arrows shot at 30 yards.

(4) For the girls the Junior Columbian Round is to be used, and this consists of 24 arrows shot at 40 yards; 24 shot at 30 yards; and 24 shot at 20 yards.

These arrows are to be shot in

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ends of six arrows; which means that a contestant will shoot at the target six times and then move to the next target.

It is the hope of Community Service that the archery groups of the community start practicing at once so as to get in shape for the meet.

Entry blanks may be had from Community Service, Inc., 549 Central Ave., Mr. W. E. Cunningham of Elm Place School or Mr. Sidney Morris. There is to be no entry fee. The event will probably be held in Sunset park.

Dumasery Spencer Auxiliary will furnish cookies, and tea will be served between the hours of two to four, Hospital day.

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
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
