

Highland Park Is Featured in State Activities Report

At a time when centralization seems to be the trend of the day, the Illinois League of Women Voters has developed a trend in the opposite direction. Perhaps the greatest impetus to League endeavors this year has been given to work at the local level and Mrs. George G. Bogart, its president, has stressed participation by local League members in the actual fact-finding surveys of local governments through a Know Your Town project.

The results have been amazing. In one town (Highland Park) the need for a change in the matter of garbage disposal was brought to the public's attention by the League's survey. In the city election which followed, the matter of garbage disposal played a decisive part. In another city (Peoria) the result of public attention to the League's fact-finding survey was establishment of a maternity-hygiene center for the benefit of the community and its mothers.

Believing that democracy needs to be practiced as well as preached, that a voter's duty does not end at the polls on election day, but continues in gathering facts and information about government, the League will assemble in convention May 8, 9, and 10 in Urbana to outline its program for the coming year.

At the Urbana convention we will choose the subjects we wish to study and set upon, said Mrs. Bogart. They are all matters that, can be, or should be the concern of government. We are careful to limit our subjects in any given period in order that we may do a good job on those we select. Each member may take part in deciding what the League will do through delegates from local Leagues. There will be over 200 delegates in attendance at convention.

We then gather facts under the leadership of national, state and local program chairmen who have made themselves experts in their fields. Hundreds of study groups organized to prepare for action use material prepared by the League.

We will continue to act, Mrs. Bogart explained, in accordance with our findings and our common point of view.

Our program of activity is completely non-partisan. We never endorse candidates but we do endorse measures and ask candidates if elected to support them.

We shall all the year round promote attention to the responsibilities of citizenship and strive to develop a more enlightened public opinion. The League is and will continue to be a protection for democracy against indifference, inefficiency, waste and dictatorship.

A large representation of the Highland Park League of Women Voters plans to attend the annual state convention of the Illinois League May 8, 9 and 10 at Urbana as delegates and alternates. Highlights on the program of the convention are a talk on the Lima conference at the opening luncheon Monday by Mrs. Louise Wright, wife of Professor Quincy Wright of the University of Chicago who attended

the conference in an advisory capacity to the State Department, and an address by Rabbi Charles E. Shulman of Glenwood on "What Does Democracy Mean?" at the banquet on Tuesday evening at the Urbana Lincoln Hotel.

Departmental business meetings at which the real work of the convention is done will take place Monday evening, Tuesday and Wednesday mornings at which plans will be discussed for fields of major emphasis in the coming year's work. A "light moment" will be provided in an "Information Please" program Monday evening with Mrs. Walter T. Fisher of Winnetka as master of ceremonies.

There will be a tour of the University ending with tea at the Women's Building on Tuesday afternoon and the final convention session on Wednesday morning will be followed by a luncheon at the Champaign Country Club where Mrs. Paul Eitel of California, secretary of the National League will report the

highlights of the General Council meeting in Washington and tell of the expansion program of the league.

Latin America will be the subject of the last meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters this spring. It will be held as a luncheon at the Y. W. C. A. on May 17. Mrs. Howell Murray is in charge of arrangements. Members of the Lake Forest, Lake Bluff and Waukegan Leagues are to be specially invited. The program in charge of Mrs. Philip Ringer has two features. A group of members who have been studying Latin America for several weeks under the leadership of Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer will give a round table report of their findings. This will be followed by a talk on the Lima Conference by Mrs. Louise Wright, national chairman of the Department of Government and Foreign Policy.
