A Mother's Day Menu For Dads

HAM TIMBALES

This delicate entree should be a real treat to the discriminating palate. It is an ideal way to utilize the left over part of your family size Tender Made Ham after you have had memorable steaks off it, and cold platters and snacks galore.
