The regular monthly meeting of the Deerfield Grammar school board of education will be held on Monday evening, May 8, in the school.

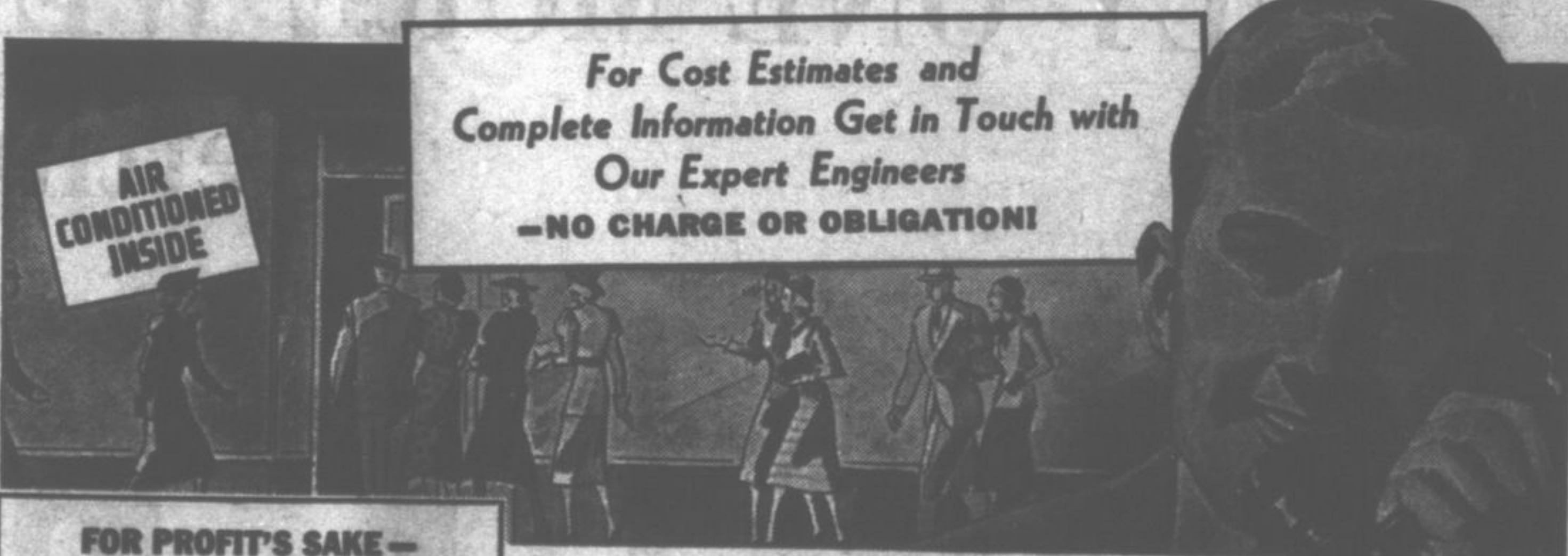
