League of Women Voters to Hear Mrs. Louise Wright

"America's Stake in Foreign Affairs" will be the subject of the address given by Mrs. Louise Wright at the last meeting of the Highland Park League of Women Voters at the Y.W.C.A. Wednesday, May 17. The meeting has been organized by the chairmen of the departments of Government and Foreign Policy and Government and Legal Status headed by Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer and Mrs. Frank Venning.

The meeting on Wednesday will begin at 10 o'clock with an open board meeting to which all members are invited. Reports of the years' work will be given by chairmen of departments and other officers. The morning meeting will be followed by a luncheon and the program under the direction of Mrs. Philip Ringer, program chairman, will take place immediately after. Members of the Waukegan, Lake Bluff and Lake Forest leagues have been invited to be present.

A round table discussion of Latin America by members of study group under the leadership of Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer will be the first feature of the program. Mrs. Howell Murray will discuss the geographical aspects of Latin America, Mrs. Douglas Boyd the historical and political background, Mrs. Lee Sipple the economic background; Mrs. Felix Norden, the Monroe doctrine, Mrs. James Clark the cultural aspects, Mrs. Maurice Pollak the financial and trade relations and the League of Nations stand in regard to Latin America and Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer Latin America and its foreign relations. Each speaker will have about four minutes to cover her particular subject. This study group which also included Mrs. Charles Grimes, Mrs. Edw. D. Porges, Mrs. Carroll Binder and Miss Edith Holmes has been studying Latin America for nearly six months in the light of questions which came before the Pan American conference at Lima last December.

Mrs. Louise Wright, wife of Professor Quincy Wright of the University of Chicago who attended the Lima conference in an advisory capacity to the State Department will follow the report on Latin America with highlights of the Lima conference and an interpretation of American policy in South America as well as its foreign policy generally.
