### Your Foot Health

Deformed Toe Nails (cont.)  
Club Nail.

Club nail is the thickening, enlargement and overgrowth of any nail on the toes. One or all nails can and may be affected.

Club nail is caused by many factors. Pressure, which can be steady or intermittent is a factor in producing a thick overgrown nail. Injury to the nail root from falling objects or from stubbing toes is also a factor. Chronic skin diseases, such as psoriasis, fungus infections, and eczema will cause club nails.

Pressure or any form of injury causes the fold on the sides of the nail to spread out and therefore allows the nail to grow much thicker. The bed on which the broad nail lies has been injured and due to the inflammatory and irritated condition a thick callous develops under the nail and instead of allowing the nail to grow outward, it forces the nail to grow upward thereby causing a thickening of the

nail, resulting in a club nail. As the nail continues to thicken, it may assume different shapes, especially those resembling horns, claws, and talons.

The thickened nail causes other ailments due to the pressure exerted on the soft tissues beneath the nail. Infections are quite common due to the fact that there is a good breeding place for bacteria under the thick nail.

In treatment of club nail, one should be very careful in cutting and trimming the nail so as not to injure surrounding tissue. If the nail repeatedly infects, it would be advisable to remove the nail by sur-

gery. This would eliminate any further complications of infection. See your doctor if the nail does become infected.

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
