

Luncheon and Bridge June 2 to Benefit Music Student Fund

Archery Tournament Is Successful Meet

Our first Archery Tournament started in a drizzling rain last Sunday afternoon but ended with the sun shining. It was everyone agreed a most interesting and successful meet.

Results and winners: Columbian Round for Girls, each girl shot 72 arrows at from 40 to 20 yards. Joyce Haworth was first hitting the target 50 times for a score of 188. Carol Laegeler was second with 44 hits and 184 points; and Betty Bench was third with 21 hits and 81 points.

American Round for Boys, each boy shot 90 arrows at from 50 to 30 yards. Jerry Sash was first hitting the target 65 times for a score of 293. Bill Wilbur came in second with 42 hits and 135 points; and George LeClerque was third with 30 hits and 118 points.

Columbian Round for Women, each contestant shooting 72 arrows at from 50 to 30 yards. Paula Raff was first with 51 hits and 219 points. Ruth Cunningham was second with 38 hits and 168 points; and Anna Mary Pantelis was third with 35 hits and 161 points.

American Round for Men, each man shooting 90 arrows at from 60 to 40 yards. W. E. Cunningham hit the target 86 times for a score of 474 for first place. Irving Brand had 77 hits and a score of 369; while R. D. Reedy had 70 hits and 294 points.

Because of the large number of requests Community Service of Highland Park will again sponsor another Archery Tournament in September.

700 Attend Rally of County Firemen Held Here Monday

Nearly 700 firemen and their families attended the seventh annual convention of the Lake County Fireman's association, held Monday in Highland Park and Highwood. The fire departments of the two cities were hosts to the association.

The day's events began with a parade from the Highland Park Central fire station, ending at the Labor Temple in Highwood. Many clever floats depicting the early days of the fire department as well as present modern equipment were entered in the parade. All of Lake county's fire departments were represented in this event. The Highland Park High School band led the parade and furnished music for those marching. Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts participated, and the Highland Park-Highwood Drum and Bugle Corps, as well as the Antioch Junior Legion Drum and Bugle Corps took part. It was very interesting to the scores of residents who lined the business section to view the parade. It recalled the days (and not so many years ago) when the Highland Park Business Men's association held Highland Park day, and all of the citizens as well as business houses contributed to a huge parade.

At the business session, officers elected were, President Foss, who succeeds Chief Frank Freeman of North Chicago; Chief Charles Nelson of the American Steel and Wire Co., re-elected vice president; Fred Hamlin of Lake Villa, re-elected treasurer, and Charles Walk of Fox Lake, was unanimously elected sergeant-at-arms after Charles Berger of the same department declined nomination to the post.

In the only contested election, Berger was defeated for the presidency, 34 votes to 18, by Foss, who is retiring sergeant-at-arms. Foss' first official act was to reappoint Norman Conrad of Waukegan secretary.

Fire Commissioner Michael J. Corrigan of Chicago presented trophies to the winning departments in the various competitions and contests held during the afternoon.

Grand prize, a cup donated by the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce, was awarded to the Fox Lake department which amassed 33 points.

Second was Lake Forest, 31, and third, Libertyville, 28. Other totals: North Chicago, 10; Waukegan, 3, and Antioch, 2. Highland Park and Highwood, the host departments, did not compete.

Judges held the most attractive float was North Chicago's. Lake Forest won the competitive ladder raising and hook-up; Libertyville the tug-of-war, and Fox Lake, the hose rolling contest.

Chief Ed Schneider of Libertyville received recognition for being the oldest fireman in Lake county in point of service, having been on the force since 1906.

Chief Jim Stearns, who is 64, was named the oldest fireman in point of age.

Judges were Chief George Knol of Cicero; Chief George Krause of Crystal Lake, Chief George Horan of Winnetka, Assistant Chief John E. Merch of Evanston, Chief R. E. Whalen of Elgin, and Chief Harry Bucher of Northbrook.

Preceding the business meeting, a

demonstration by the Chicago fire insurance patrol and the various contests were held. Then at 4 p.m. in the Labor Temple President Freeman rapped his gavel to open the session.

Greetings were extended the 650 guests and delegates (each department was allowed three delegates) by Fire Chief Edward Hoskins of Highland Park, Chief Arthur Englund of Highwood, Mayor Frank Ronan of Highland Park and Chas. Portilla of Highwood.

Fireman Noel White, Fox Lake, delegate, then spoke of the volunteer firemen's pension bill currently in its second reading in the state house of representatives.

White, who has made several trips to Springfield as a representative of the county association, said that the bill stands a "fine chance of passage."

After routine business was transacted, President Freeman introduced Chief Frank C. McAuliffe of the Chicago fire insurance patrol as the principal speaker at the convention.

McAuliffe started his audience by asserting that the old fireman was superior to the new. "Where the old-timer," he said, "sought out flames in fighting fires, the modern laddies are content with their high-powered hoses to knock the flames out."

The Chicago chief concluded his address with a plea for firemen to seek publicity. "The best way to court the public's favor is to present a neat appearance—both personal and your station and equipment."

The day's events concluded with a buffet supper, followed by entertainment in the Labor Temple, at which nearly 2,000 persons were present.

Funeral Services For Arthur Trout Held Last Friday

Arthur M. Trout, 62, passed away at his home, 104 Elm avenue, Highwood, last Wednesday following a long illness. Mr. Trout had been a

resident of Highwood for twenty-eight years, and had served as a conductor with the North Shore railroad for twenty-five years. He is survived by two sons, Leale and Arthur of Highwood and a daughter, Sylvia Anderson, of Kenosha, and a granddaughter, Jean.
