 sent a saving of \$3.50, since they include 18 coupons, each good either for a 75-cent admission or a 75-cent reserved seat at any regular concert during the season.

Sir Adrian Boult, who will conduct the first two weeks at Ravinia, is a newcomer to music in the Midwest. He is internationally famous as musical director of the British Broadcasting Company orchestra. He has conducted major orchestras abroad and was enthusiastically received in guest appearances with the Boston Symphony Orchestra and General Motors orchestra in 1934 as well as with the NBC Symphony Orchestra last season after Toscanini's engagement. Sir Adrian is to conduct the New York Philharmonic-Symphony in two British concerts at the New York World Fair on June 9 and 10. Vladimir Golschmann, who will

direct at Ravinia during the third and fourth weeks, is the conductor of the St. Louis Symphony Orchestra. Golschmann's work during the 1937 Ravinia Festival was a highlight of that season. His brilliant career began in France and he has made frequent guest appearances there with the Pasdeloup, Paris Symphony orchestras, Revue Musicale and Stravinsky and Ravel Festivals. In America he has conducted the New York Philharmonic, Philadelphia Orchestra, Detroit Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic and Hollywood Bowl orchestras.

Arthur Rodzinski, chosen for the last two weeks at Ravinia, is conductor of the Cleveland Orchestra. He was considered by many the outstanding conductor of the 1938 Ravinia season. His five years with the Cleveland Orchestra have led to engagements as guest conductor with virtually every great orchestra in America and in Europe. He is an American citizen, born in Poland. Other Festival appearances have included the Salzburg, Hollywood Bowl and Portland.

### Brief Review of Christian Science Lecture Given May 18

 by the time they got to the police station, swore out a warrant and returned with the police the burglar could be miles away. It appears that in their case that they have city taxation without receiving city benefits and it seems logical that so long as the city doesn't give them the benefits, that they should be allowed to have their property disconnected from the city.

**Election Expenses**  
 The Illinois Statute provides that all candidates elected to the city council, under the Commission Form of Government, must publish within 30 days after qualifying their sworn statement of election and campaign expenses (including primary election) and by whom the funds were contributed. Last week three of the commissioners and the Mayor published their expenses and names of contributors. Commissioner Sharp is the only officer who has not published his report. Commissioner Gourley stated that his expenses were nothing.

Mayor Ronan states his expenses were \$420.75; funds being contri-

buted by Chas. W. Jones and Frank J. Ronan.

Commissioner Bowen states his expenses at \$204.65; all funds being contributed by himself.

Commissioner Swanson sets his expenses at \$213.75; his funds being contributed by C. Kasel \$25; C. Hampler \$25; unknown \$20; and A. H. Swanson \$143.75.

It is quite remarkable that the campaign expenses of the candidates were so small and that there were so few contributors, especially in view of the hard fought election, the many parties, advertisements, circulars and campaign letters.
