### H. P. High School Is Approved By N. Central Ass'n.

The Highland Park high school has been approved by the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary schools for the period ending June 30, 1940, according to an announcement just received by Miss Busard, principal. This means that recommended students of our high school may enter institutions of higher learning within the North Central states without entrance examinations.

The association prepares each year a new list of approved secondary schools accorded this honor. No school is approved for a period longer than one year.

Before any school can be considered for approval by the North Central association, it must be on the highest list of schools accredited by the school authorities within the state. It must meet the regulations of the association in such matters as instruction and spirit, school plant, sanitation and janitorial service, instructional equipment, school library, school records, financial support, and the preparation of the instruction staff.

The association approves secondary schools in twenty states comprising a large portion of north central and central United States.

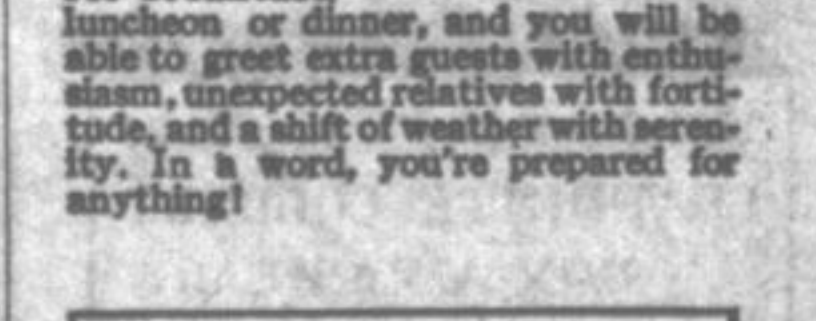
