

### Dr. Henry Gradle Mother of Local Physician Passes On

Mrs. Henry (Fannie Searis) Gradle, a former resident of Waukegan, and the mother of Dr. Harry Gradle of this city, died Wednesday at her home in Santa Barbara, Calif. She was 88 years old.

Dr. Gradle, the widow of Dr. Henry Gradle, Chicago ophthalmologist, never practiced medicine, but was credited during her childhood with having discovered during an inspection trip of gold mines in Southern Nevada two totally unknown species of flowers. These were catalogued by Prof. Marcy of Northwestern university, then sent on to the Smithsonian institute, where they were named for Fanny Searis and Prof. Marcy. These were

then placed on file among the native American wildflowers.

Although Chicago was the official residence of the Gradles from 1881 to 1911, their summers were spent in Waukegan, in the home built by William S. Searis in 1846. This home was donated to the Hattie Barwell Settlement association after the death of Dr. Henry Gradle in 1911, at which time Dr. Fannie Gradle took up residence in Santa Barbara with her son, Roy S.

Two nieces, Mrs. Frank C. Hough and Mrs. F. W. Chase, also live in Highland Park. A brother-in-law, Walter Gradle, lives in Lake Forest.

Dr. Gradle was born in Waukegan on Sept. 21, 1851, the daughter of Cuthbert Stewart Searis and Emily Cuthbert Searis. She was educated at the Methodist Female Seminary of Evanston, which institu-

tion was absorbed during her senior year by Northwestern university. From here she received an AB degree in 1871, entered the medical department of the University of Michigan, and was graduated as an MD in 1877.

Unable to obtain an internship, she later entered Bellevue hospital in New York, as a student nurse. She remained in this capacity until her marriage to Dr. Gradle in 1881. Funeral services were held in Santa Barbara Friday.

### Plan Mock Court For Women Voters Opening Meeting

Preceding a tea party for new members of the board of the Highland Park League of Women Voters held at the home of Mrs. Maurice Pollak Wednesday afternoon, May 31, suggestions of the program committee which met last week to plan next year's work were endorsed.

Mrs. Philip Ringer, program chairman, reported that the first meeting would be planned by Mrs. George Gaidzik and would take the form of ties of jury service. Since the Women on Juries law has just passed on the Illinois legislature, Leagues all over the state are planning to instruct their members in their new duties so they can be intelligent jurors when the time comes. It is hoped that a well known judge will be present to answer questions about grand jury service, petit jury service, and other court procedure that women should know.

Further plans for the coming year's work include a study class led by Mrs. Monroe Ottenheimer, chairman of the Department of Government and Education on federal aid to education. The National League has never taken any stand on this subject but has recommended it for study. The November program will be on this subject following the study class. Mrs. Ferdinand Kramer announced that her department of Government and Foreign Policy would resume its study class, the subject to be decided upon later.

The Department of Government and Child Welfare will have a program sometime during the year on parole as concerns minors. It is planned also to have several tours next year on the work of various departments since members who went on the housing tour this spring felt so enthusiastic about this phase of the work.

There will be no special program devoted to new members this next year. Instead it is planned to have several small meetings in members' homes in between meetings to acquaint new members with the work of the League. These small meetings will culminate in a tea party for all new members. Questionnaires are to be continued at the meeting since the general membership found themselves better acquainted with the work of various departments.

### Late George Hesler Would Have Been 100 Years Old Today

Had George Hesler, a pioneer resident of Highland Park vicinity, lived until today (Thursday), June 1, he would have celebrated his centennial anniversary. He died Dec. 15, 1932.

Mr. Hesler was born in Bavaria, Germany, June 1, 1839, and came to the United States when 9 years of age. From that time he had resided in this vicinity, until the date of his death. For many years he

was engaged in farming, his home being near the entrance to Ravinia Park. Much of this territory has been subdivided and at the present

time many homes are being erected on this farm land.
