CURB SHRUBBERY A HAZARD

A few days ago citizens of Highland Park received a circular letter from the Highland Park Safety Commission urging all property owners to remove or trim curb shrubbery. In a recent visit to Highland Park, the Illinois State Safety Inspector said, "Highland Park has the worst curb shrubbery hazard of any city in the state."

As public spirited citizens you do not want your city branded in this matter, nor do you want your city to head the list of death casualties, due to this hazard.

A life is far more valuable than all the beauty which such shrubbery may lend to your property.

Mayor Frank Ronan seeks your aid in this matter. He does not want to enforce rigid measures similar to those imposed by neighboring communities upon their property owners.

Remove all obstacles from your parkway which tend to obstruct the vision of both motorist and pedestrian. Do not allow shrubbery to remain at corners of street intersections, driveways or sidewalks. Report all dangerous locations to the Safety Commission who will confer with the property owner and seek to remove the hazard.

This is your opportunity to help your city, and to help preserve the lives of its citizens. It may be your property which is responsible for the loss of a life, or it may be some member of your family who is the victim of someone's curb shrubbery hazard.

Let's all back the Safety Commission in their drive against this menace and make Highland Park one of the ranking cities for Safety observance.
