

Ravinia Festival Ticket Campaign Begun This Week

The coupon book campaign for the Ravinia music festival swung into high gear this week with North Shore committees assigned with quotas for each community.

The committees have a truly great six-week season to "sell". Three world-famous conductors will direct the Chicago Symphony orchestra, and already two famous soloists have been announced.

The season opens on June 29, with concerts every Thursday, Friday and Saturday evenings and Sunday afternoons. Sir Adrian Boult, noted director of the British Broadcasting Company orchestra, takes the baton for the first two weeks. He is followed by Vladimir Golschmann, youthful conductor of the St. Louis Symphony orchestra, who was considered the outstanding conductor of Ravinia's 1937 season.

During the last two weeks, Arthur Rodzinski, conductor of the Cleveland orchestra, whose work was the highlight of last season at Ravinia, will be on the podium. Josef Hoffmann, one of the world's great pianists and a favorite in Chicago's music circles, will be soloist on Friday and Saturday nights, June 30 and July 1. Emanuel Feuermann, who is called by many critics the world's greatest cellist, will be soloist on Saturday night and Sunday afternoon, July 15 and 16. Other soloists and gala performances will be announced later.

J. Eugene Davis, Ravinia's ticket chairman, swung his financial baton and issued the quotas for coupon book sales to committee chairmen as follows:

3 Outstanding Shows to Attract Visitors to Riverview Park

The visitor to Riverview Park this season will find, in addition to the countless fast and exciting rides and the mysterious, unpredictable "fun houses," three outstanding shows.

No. 1 thrill show now playing at "Chicago's Own World's Fair" is the "Death Dodgers," a troupe of three girls and three men who make motorcycles defy gravity in a perilous bowl with sides banked 90 degrees.

John Peluso, riding at top speed, climbs his motorcycle up the steep wall and then, removing his hands from the handlebars and feet from the lower controls, stretches out across the saddle on his back, at right angles to the direction of travel.

Another hair-raiser comes when two girls stand against the wall of the bowl and Peluso rides around the bowl at head level. The girls duck their heads forward to avoid the wheels.

"Lost River" presents Zola, a woman who lies in a pit filled with snakes. Wearing one snake around her waist as a belt, she fondles the rest as if they were kittens. The "Lost River" show also presents rare animals and birds, including the only carroway in this country. The carroway is a huge bird with hair instead of feathers and in its other characteristics resembles nothing native to America.

The weak-hearted should avoid the "Headless Soldier" show unless they are miraculously adept at fathoming illusions. The audience sees a live soldier who moves his hands and feet and appears perfectly normal, except that he has no head. It also sees him "fed" with a fluid pumped from a jar through tubes which appear to enter his neck.

The "mystery ride" had its American premiere last week. The ride is called the "Moon Rocket" and adds a new kind of thrill to Riverview's unequalled collection. It is said to be the fastest ride ever operated in America.

Former Army Men May Enlist in Grade Held When Discharged

The regular army reserve has extended opportunity for enlistment to all former men under 36 years of age. Restrictions have been modified to permit married men and those out of the service more than three years to enlist. Any man discharged as a noncommissioned officer is authorized to enlist in grade held at time of last discharge. No military duty will be required from those who are accepted but all would be subject to call to active duty during an emergency declared by the president. While on inactive status, a reservist will be paid at the rate of \$24 a year, payable every 4 months in installments of \$8. If called to active duty, each reservist would be paid an additional cash allowance upon reporting of \$3 for each month he has been enlisted in the regular army reserve, but not to exceed \$150. His pay while in active service would be the same as that of other members of the regular army of corresponding grade.
