Men's Garden Club Holds First Meeting Tuesday Evening

At its initial meeting, held last Tuesday evening in the lounge of the Women's Club, the Men's Garden Club of Highland Park was officially launched. Approximately 50 charter and prospective members were in attendance. They were welcomed by Eugene Pfister, president, who outlined the club's by-laws, plans and future objectives. Mr. Larry Abt then introduced the two guest speakers for the evening.

Hoyt F. Paxton, president of the Men's Garden Clubs of Illinois and first vice-president of the Men's Garden Clubs of America, outlined the history of garden club activities for men in the state and in the national organization. "There are today eight men's garden clubs in Illinois," said Mr. Paxton, "with a total membership of over 350."

The second speaker was Oakley V. Morgan, past president of Men's Garden Clubs of America, and also of Chicago and chief horticulturist for the Commonwealth Edison Company.

The next meeting of the Highland Park Club will occur Wednesday evening, July 12, at which Alfred C. Hottes, prominent national garden authority, will be the speaker. Mr. Hottes is the author of numerous books on gardening, and serves as associate editor of Better Homes and Gardens Magazine. Since his address will be of such wide appeal to all garden lovers, it was announced that the wives of Garden Club members will be invited to this meeting. The meeting will be held in the auditorium of the Highland Park Women's Club.

It was announced that the national convention of the Men's Garden Clubs of America is to be held July 13, 14 and 15 in Elmhurst, Ill., on the Campus of Elmhurst College. A cordial invitation to attend this convention was extended to all members of the newly formed Men's Garden Club of this city.

The Post Office Department, for the first time, is accepting from children in grade or high schools, single self-addressed envelopes, accompanied by 3c in cash, at your local post office for forwarding to Cooperstown, N. Y., where the Baseball Centennial Stamp will be affixed and canceled on June 12, the first day of the sale of this special commemorative 3c stamp, and be returned by mail to the addressee.

This stamp commemorates the place and time of the beginning of our American game of baseball. It will be especially nice for all boys and girls interested in baseball or stamps or both to have a first cover of this commemorative issue.

Your self-addressed envelope and 3c must, however, be left at the Highland Park postoffice not later than this Saturday, June 10.

On May 17 the Elm Place P.T.A. held its annual meeting at which time the following women were elected to serve as officers for 1939-40:

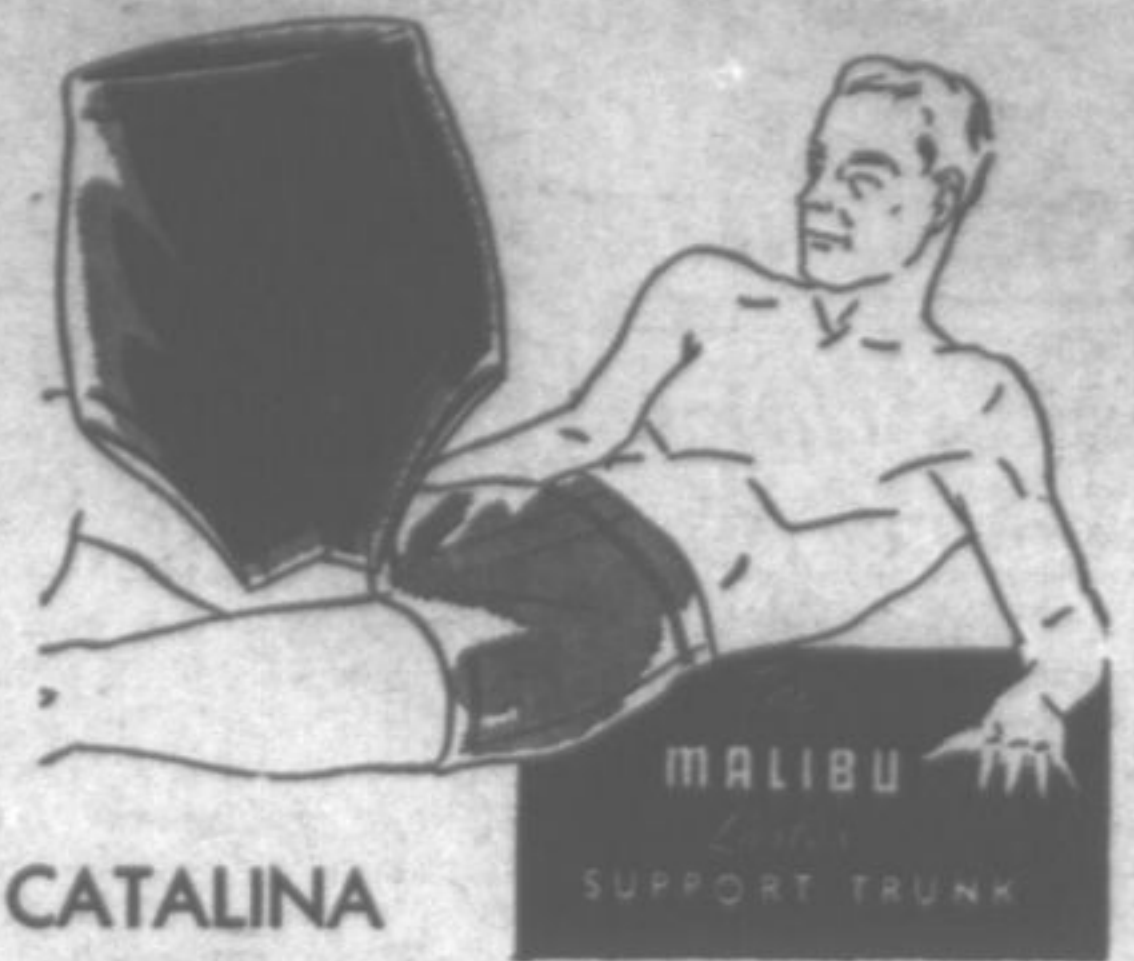
