This is the tenth anniversary of the parish of the Holy Cross church, previous to that time being a mission, and part of St. Patrick's church of Everett. The first pastor of the church after it was separated from the north parish was Rev. Charles McDonough, who has since passed away. Some of his friends among the clergy have given a memorial window to the church in his memory. It is a beautiful window for the north wall of the sanctuary. The subject pictured is the conferring of the keys to Peter when the Lord told him that whatsoever he would loose on earth would be loosed also in heaven and he made him chief of the Apostles.
