North Shore Line Announces Rail-Lake Trips for Summer

A 170-mile rail-lake trip between any point on the North Shore Line and Chicago and Milwaukee, to be operated daily during the summer season, has been announced by officials of the railroad. The lake cruise between the two cities will be made on the Chicago-Milwaukee Steamship Company's "City of Grand Rapids."

A uniform fare will be in effect from any station on the North Shore Line, including Chicago and Milwaukee. Persons living outside the two cities may travel to Chicago by train, from there to Milwaukee by boat and back to starting point by rail, or the circle trip may be made in the reverse direction.

The "City of Grand Rapids" leaves Chicago daily at 9:45 a.m. and arrives in Milwaukee at 2:45 p.m. On the return trip it sails at 4:45 and arrives in Chicago at 9:45 p.m.

Home Projects Are Being Financed by Loan Association

Two large scale private home development projects of the north shore have been financed by the Home Federal Savings and Loan association of Chicago, the company announced this week. The two developments, Irving Bluet's "Connecticut Village in Kenilworth and Geo. F. Nixon's "Glenayre" in Glenview, have involved financing running into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

The association has more than 6,500 savings accounts with \$5,000,000 in resources, and within the first six months of this year granted mortgages amounting to more than \$1,500,000.

It has been prominently identified with building operations in the Chicago area for over half a century. Charles A. Zundalek, president, predicts that the last half of the year will be even more outstanding for home building than the first half because of an increasing interest among prospective suburban home buyers.

For the second time within one year Home Federal Savings and Loan Association of Chicago, 1618 W. 18th street, is launching another expansion program. It has purchased the adjoining property at 1616 W. 18th street, 25x125, improved with a 3-story brick building. The building is to be razed and improved with a modern designed addition of Verdi Antique marble and glass brick at a cost of \$20,000. Plans have been drawn by William

Sovic, Chicago architect. Work will be started immediately after the rush of seasonal business on or about July 15.

Last year over \$10,000 was spent on a remodeling program. The rapid expansion of Home Federal Savings and Loan association has made it necessary to advance a three-year improvement program into one year according to Mr. Charles A. Zundalek, president.
