Jenka Slevos, Noted Woman Cellist on Wilmette Program

Jenka Slevos, principal cellist of the Illinois Symphony Orchestra and one of the country's outstanding women cellists, will be featured as soloist with the orchestra in the opening concert of the "Starlight Symphony" series in Wilmette amphitheater next Wednesday evening (July 12). Later Solomon will conduct.

The announcement of Miss Slevos' appearance as soloist will be welcomed by North Shore music lovers who know of her work with the Illinois Symphony, Civic Orchestra, and the Seidenberg Sinfonietta. She is the only feminine member of the latter organization. She will be heard by thousands in the lake-front amphitheater Wednesday as she plays Boellman's "Variations Symphoniques."

The balance of the program to be presented under Conductor Solomon's baton includes "The Bartered Bride" by Smetana, the "New World Symphony" by Shostakovich, and "Marche Slave" by Tchaikovsky. The program, which is scheduled to start at 8:15 o'clock, is one of a series sponsored by a number of Wilmette civic organizations in cooperation with the federal music project of Illinois.

Silverstein Meets Japanese Champion Friday Evening

Oriental ju-jitsu versus American catch-as-catch can wrestling, which is the more effective?
Lake county wrestling fans who attend the weekly bouts in Peg's Grayslake arena are going to see this age-old sport question answered before their eyes Friday night when Ruffy Silverstein, Illinois champion and expert at the catch-as-catch can style, meets Matti Matsura, Japanese black-belt ju-jitsu champion, in a mixed match intended to set-

tle once and for all time the long standing feud between them as well as the question of superiority between these forms of self-defense.
A month ago the pair met here under American rules, but Matsura quit in the middle of the match when the referee refused him the use of his ju-jitsu tricks. After considerable challenging by the Jap for a chance at Ruffy under his own style, the mixed match was finally closed.

According to the rules of Friday's battle, the match will consist of 3 or more 20 minute rounds. One round will be fought under the American rules while the other under ju-jitsu with the wrestlers wearing the famous judo-ju-jitsu jackets. Whoever wins his round in the shortest time will have the privilege of deciding the rules of the final and deciding round. But if no falls are scored by either in the first two rounds, two more rounds will take place.

Besides this unusual main event, the first of its kind ever permitted in Illinois, an all-star card of three supporting matches have been lined-up.

Frankie Talaber, former light-heavyweight champion of the world who recently relinquished his throne because he could not keep under the 175 pound weight limit, returns for his second appearance at the local lake arena, this time against the colorful Arabian, Sheik Mar-Allah. Now tipping the beam at 200 pounds Frankie is seeking world title honors in the heavyweight ranks.

The prelims should be especially exciting this week with the Great Balbo tangle with flashy Lefty Pacer in one, while Jerry Meeker, Hawaiian star, tackling handsome Frankie Hart, Holland's bid to mat honors, in the other. Ladies are invited to attend free in the ring-side section with escort.
