Illinois Reserve Officers at Fort

One hundred and twenty two officers from Chicago and other Illinois cities, comprising a composite brigade, of Coast Artillery (anti-aircraft) in command of Colonel Howard W. Hodgkins, 1st National Bank Bldg., Chicago, reported at Fort Sheridan today for a two weeks intensive training period. Included in their specialized artillery training is the use of 3-inch guns firing service ammunition at a cylindrical cloth target 40 feet long, towed 3,000 feet behind an Army Air Corps plane flying at 175 miles an hour. These guns are automatically aimed by a device that takes into account direction and velocity of wind and plane, height of target and time needed for flight of projectile. These officers will also fire 30 caliber anti-aircraft machine guns at hydrogen filled balloons that are released over Lake Michigan. Other phases of training include intricate problems on orientation of all types of anti-aircraft weapons, night drill is employed in which giant Sperry search lights of a billion candle power and capable of lighting a plane at 20,000 feet is used. Recent developments in foreign countries have indicated that anti-aircraft artillery will play an increasingly important role in any future emergency. The officers are showing a keen enthusiasm in their desire to perfect themselves in the technique of the "Sky Guns."
