Evanston Legionnaires invite High- land Parkers to try this as a new form of setting up exercises. As a matter of fact the dare-devils in the tip-of-Chicago suburb have been doing it as setting down exercises (sleepy time capers to you) since they have become rodeo conscious. The post is presenting a gigantic rodeo—round-up and stampe de the entire week of July 24 at a special arena located at Main street and Fowler avenue.
 "Little dimpled darling of the rodeo world."
 That's what they call Shirley Lou Adams, eight-year-old juvenile riding queen, who will be a part of the great rodeo being sponsored by Evanston post No. 42 of the American Legion July 24 to 29.
 Not only by her sweet personal-ity but by her sheer ability to do things on the back of a horse or pony that even some of the old timers would not hazard has won her world acclaim. Going over and under and all around her swift speed-ing mount "Sunny Boy" you might say that this sweet little girl was born on the hurricane deck of a racing cayuse.
 Coming from a family of noted riders, her mother, Minnie Adams, is one of America's foremost horse-women, and her daddy, George V. Adams, is known wherever horses,

cattle and men assemble. So after all it is not so strange that this demure little miss should follow in the footsteps of her noted parents.
 Pure bred Brahma-steers, the on-ly herd of these sacred beasts of India, will be on exhibition at the show. There will be over a hundred head of horses and other cattle while scores of sun tanned and saddle bred sons and daughters of the colorful west are expected to turn Evanston into a virtual "sow-town" for the week. The entire week's events are expected to attract nearly 100,000 persons and the picture will be one of pounding hoofs, swishing lariats intermingled with the round-up cries of the cowboys, the beating of Indian tom toms and the blood curdling yells of the last of the savages in their Indian war dances.
