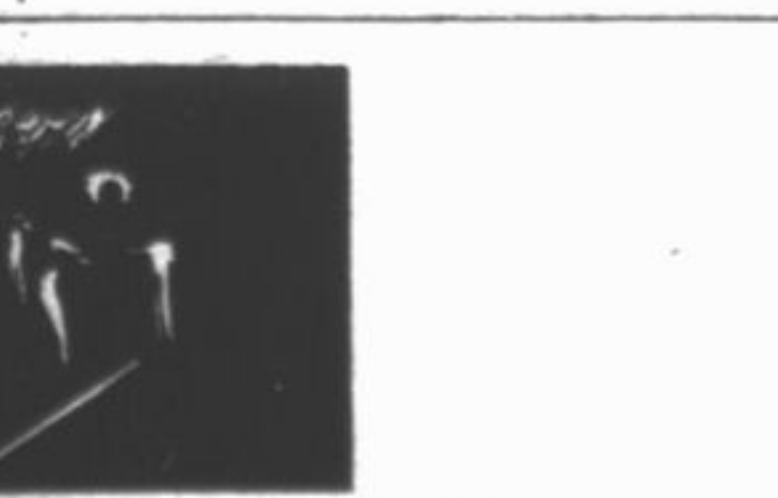
Highland Park-Ravinia Kiwanis Club Play Ball Monday
