DEERFIELD DAYS WILL BE BENEFIT FOR VILLAGE FINANCES

Trustee Homer G. Cazel of the Deerfield board will be the general chairman for a carnival to be held on Saturday, Sunday, and Labor Day, September 2, 3, and 4, and the money cleared on these "Deerfield Days" will be used to help pay some of the village's bills. Last year the village was able to pay off \$2,000 on old bills through a carnival and the village board is planning another for the same purpose. It will be held in the Goldman subdivision, where the Legion recently held theirs.

OLD AGE ASSISTANCE GRANTED TO 28 IN DEERFIELD

Mrs. Zeta M. Poff, superintendent of the Lake County Department of the Division of Old Age Assistance recently notified James O'Connor, supervisor of West Deerfield Township, Deerfield, that there are now 28 persons who are receiving Old Age Assistance in this township and their total awards in April of 1939 were \$459.00. There is one application pending and three reinvestigations are being made.

When an individual applies for this aid, he must prove need, age, residence, citizenship, and the burden of proof rests on his legally responsible relatives to show that they cannot support him. After he has been granted his allowance he can no longer receive poor relief from the supervisor, except emergency medical care. Old Age Assistance is available to needy aged persons whose needs can be met by \$30.00 or less per month. Lack of understanding of the provision in the basic law of this OAA act has caused considerable trouble. Due to the fact that recipients now understand that the State has a very definite claim against their estates, it has been found that claims are being met promptly by those individuals who receive inheritances or dispose of their property. During the first five months in 1939 the Lake County Division of OAA has received \$1,318.40 in reimbursements and repayments of claims.

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Requests Exam for Deerfield

Nomination of John J. Welch turned down by senate at Slattery's demand

Washington, D. C. (Special)—Because of "urgent requests" made upon him, Senator James Slattery is to ask the civil service commission that open competitive examinations be held for the purpose of establishing a list of eligibles for the postmaster at Deerfield.

When the nomination of John J. Welch for appointment as postmaster came to the senate it was rejected, same as was the nomination of Raymond A. Kennedy for the postmastership at Libertyville.

No other explanation was offered than that Senator Slattery had lent his ear to these "urgent requests." It was explained, however, that the rejection of the confirmation was "nothing personal" against either Welch or Kennedy.

The present postmaster, in other words, will serve at least a few months. In the first place the necessary papers will be drawn up, notices posted that an open examination will be held. The applicants may file for the position, after which a date will be set. Usually, after the exams are over it requires some six to eight weeks for certification of the one or more eligibles, and then it's up to the high moguls of the party to recommend one of the eligibles.

Water Main Breaks Under Bridge At Deerfield

Deerfield residents were without water from 2 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. on Tuesday because of a broken water main at the east boundary of the village under the Gastfield bridge. It is the only main leading into Deerfield, so no one in the village had water during that time. Fortunately there were no fires.

A state employe, driving a tractor which levels off the banks of the road and is also used in stump pulling, was working on Deerfield road. In order to cross from one side of the road to the other, he drove his tractor under the bridge where the water main lies very shallow and the weight of the machine broke the pipe. Water Commissioner William D. Johnston and his staff of workers completed the repairs, and Mr. Johnston remained most of the night flushing all water hydrants to carry off dirty water.

The two beauty shops in Deerfield could give no shampoos and business was at a standstill there. The telephone operators were swamped with calls and inquiries about the water.

Dr. C. Johnston Davis, village health commissioner, warned all residents that the water was impure and for the next 48 hours should be boiled.
