Today I saw a mother deliberately pull her young daughter, about 7 or 8 years old, and start across the street in the middle of the block. Communities throughout the country are making a special drive to educate pedestrians. Pedestrians are involved in approximately 40 per cent of all automobile fatalities. Statistics show that in more than two-thirds of the fatal pedestrian accidents in 1938, the pedestrian was walking in an unsafe manner, walking across highways, between intersections, and jaywalking at intersections.

You parents who read this, please teach your children to walk and drive carefully; and the best way to do this is to set the example yourselves.

Many accidents occur while passing because the passing driver either misjudges the space he has or because he is a road hog and attempts to take what he is not entitled to, depending on the other fellow to slow down to give him space.

Check your stop light and tail light tonight and every night; the 30 seconds to do it may save your and other lives.

Chains do not give full protection on hard ice or a wet pavement—so drive carefully.

If there is any place that a driver should be especially careful to stay in the proper lane, it is on curves and hills.

Twenty-foot pavements are only two 10-foot roads side by side—stay in the middle of your 10-foot lane.

Stop cautiously so other drivers may govern themselves accordingly.

Give a long warning horn blast before you start to pass, not after you're alongside the car ahead.

The pedestrian always has the right of way on an established cross walk, even if he is moving against the red light.

Even if you do have the right of way over a jaywalker, that doesn't entitle you to run over him.

A car in the intersection always has first claim to right of way.

On through streets, the driver with courtesy will give the car trying to enter or cross a chance to get in.

Highways are happy ways when they lead the way to home—in safety.

Carrying spare light bulbs should be done more religiously than carrying a spare tire, for the lack of a spare tire will merely cause delay, while the lack of a spare bulb may cause an accident.

Persons who are sick or disabled cannot collect Unemployment Compensation.

Deductions from pay checks in Illinois are for old age insurance—not for Unemployment Compensation.

Only persons who earned \$225 or more at insured jobs in 1938 can become eligible for Unemployment Compensation between now and March 31, 1940.

Unemployment insurance claimants who falsify statements in their applications for benefits are subject to prosecution and penalties.

Persons who claim Unemployment Compensation benefits are not accepting charity or relief. The payments are based on earnings in past employment.

The chief aim of the Illinois State Employment Service is to match men and jobs.

Approximately 2,000,000 workers are protected by the Illinois Unemployment Compensation program.

THE VODER

THE ONLY "ACTOR" in the Bell Telephone Exhibit at the N. Y. World's Fair is "Pedro the Voder," the artificial voice which speaks entirely from electrical currents without the aid of the human throat. Handling keys which govern sounds corresponding to those which originate in the vocal cords and breath, a specially trained telephone operator makes the Voder respond to an interlocutor's questions and those asked by the listening audience.

Answers: 1. A mineral spring discovered about 1618 at Epsom, England. For about ten years the water was used as an external remedy for sores, but then acquired considerable reputation as a medicinal water for internal use. By the evaporation of this water we have Epsom Salts.
2. He was a Danish physician who, in 1927, was awarded the Nobel prize in medicine for his work on cancer. He found a way of producing cancer artificially in mice. This work greatly advanced the opportunity of investigators to study cancer and may be the fundamental work that eventually will yield a solution to this medical problem.
3. Nero is said to have consumed nothing but milk for a period of six months as a cure for an illness.
