1940 License Plates Are Brown and Cream

Springfield (AP) — the color scheme for 1940 Illinois automobile license plates will be cream and coffee.

The contract for the new plates has been let to the National Color-type company of Bellevue, Ky, which has a low bid of approximately nine cents.

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
