

Judges Named for Dog Show Sept. 17 at Lake Forest

Mrs. Berndalyn Kewley, secretary of the Shore Land Kennel club, which is staging the dog show at Onwentsia Country club in Lake Forest on September 17, this week announced receipt from the American Kennel club of the approved list of judges.

William T. Pym of Vancouver, B.C., will act as judge of the sporting breeds group, with the exception of pointers, retrievers and setters, which will be judged by C. G. Hendee of Chicago, and cocker spaniels, to be judged by Miss Doris Flagg of Oak Park, Illinois.

In the hound breeds group, Mr. Pym will act as judge of all breeds except whippets, which are assigned to Dr. R. C. Clement of Peoria, Ill., and he will also head up the working dogs with the following exceptions: collies by Harry A. Meyer of Indianapolis, Ind.; Doberman Pinschers by Owen A. West of Lake Forest, Ill.; German Shepherds and St. Bernards by Dr. Clement; and Great Danes by Colonel Dale Richards of Milwaukee, Wisconsin.

The terriers will have as judge of group Mrs. Marie A. Stone, Milwaukee, who will handle all breeds except the following: Mr. Pym will judge border terriers, bull terriers, Dandie Dinmonts, Kerry Blue terriers, Lakeland, Lhasa, Manchester, Norwich, Skye and Staffordshire terriers. Irish terriers will be handled by Russell R. Hughes of Harvey, Ill., and P. K. Groves of Olympia Fields, Ill., will judge Scottish terriers.

Mrs. Stanley E. Ferguson of Lake Geneva, Wis., will act as judge of group and all breeds in the Toy division.

Non-sporting dogs will have J. P. Hackett, Birmingham, Michigan, as judge of group and all breeds except: Boston terriers, to be judged by P. J. Shannon of Chicago, and Chow Chows, another of Mr. Pym's assignments.

Mr. Pym will also handle best in show and miscellaneous breeds. Mrs. L. T. Knott of Lake Forest will judge the girls in the children's classes and Mrs. Conway H. Olmsted of Lake Forest will handle the boys. John R. Roberts of Evanston will judge the obedience classes.

More than 700 dogs are expected to be entered in this year's classic, according to Mrs. Kewley. Further information may be had by contacting her at 1055 Granville avenue.

McMillen to Meet Von Schacht Friday at Grayslake Arena

Riverview Offers Excitement Galore in Seven Thrill Rides

With their breath-taking plunges down almost perpendicular tracks and their exciting whirrs around hairpin turns, roller coasters are the foundation of the amusement park business. Appropriately enough Riverview Park, the world's largest amusement park, has the world's largest battery of coaster rides.

If Riverview's seven thrilling coaster rides were combined into one straight track, the ride would extend four miles beyond the park's boundaries. The park leads the world not only in aggregate track footage but also on number of rides. No other park has more than five.

Riverview has had many other coasters in its history, such as the Derby, the Jack Rabbit, the Royal Gorge and the Figure 8, but these have been torn down to make room for the more modern, streamlined Silver Flash, Blue Streak and Zephyr.

Of the present seven coasters the Bobs is the fastest and the most popular. Using open cars with foam rubber shock-absorbing seats, the Bobs hits a speed of 64 miles an hour at the bottom of the first dip. So distinctive are the steep grades and the hairpin curves at the foot of the dips, that the name Bobs is now applied to a whole classification of coaster construction.

Contrary to popular belief, however, the Bobs is not the park's oldest ride. The Greyhound not only is older, but also 500 feet longer, more than three-quarters of a mile. Of the five "straight" coasters, the Bobs, Blue Streak, Silver Flash, Zephyr, and Greyhound, not one fails to exceed the half-mile mark in trackage.

Each ride has distinctive characteristics. The Silver Flash is the world's only stainless steel coaster ride. The Blue Streak has an unusual dip arrangement, high and low dips alternating throughout the ride. The Zephyr has a long series of dips almost the same size. All three of these rides, the Silver Flash, Blue Streak and Zephyr, have covered cars.

Two other coaster rides, the Krazy Ribbon and Flying Turns, have shorter tracks than the rest, but have compensating features of their own. Cars on the Krazy Ribbon are circular and revolve while hurtling down the steep dips and around cork-screw curves. The Flying Turns works on the principle of a bobbed, with the cars climbing the banked turns to more than a 90 degree angle.

The seven rides together constitute an unbeatable combination for reaching the heights of fun, thrills and excitement.

F. J. Foss Chosen Vice President of Wilson and Company

Following the monthly Directors' Meeting of Wilson & Co., today, Mr. Thos. E. Wilson, chairman of the

In October, 1929, was sent to Buenos Aires as Assistant Manager. Returned to the United States in April 1924, and worked under Mr. J. Moog, later Mr. C. D. Middlebrook, following South American business, until April 1927.

In 1927 returned to Buenos Aires as Manager, and remained there until August 1936 when returned to the United States.

Since August 1936 has been in the Beef Dept., Chicago, following Cattle Buying operations.

Mr. Foss won fame as a pole vaulter during his college career and later as a member of the 1920 United States Team at the Olympic games in Antwerp, Belgium, won the event for the United States and established a new pole vault record which stood for many years.
