

Illinois Electricity Users Consume 13 Pct. Gives Trophy For More Power This Year Pet Show, Aug. 26

suburbs and the outlying farm and residential territory.

Mr. Budd stated that residential customers of his company and the 22,000 farms were now using electricity at the rate of 950 kilowatthours a year, which is among the nighest consumption averages used on the same basis was only 574 kilowatt-hours per year. This increase, Mr. Budd stated, has been due to three factors: the lowered rates which are being charged for the service, natural growth in the use of electricity in the ordinary home through the more general use of electrical appliances, and to the fact that electric lines have been brought to all but about 18 per cent of the farmers in this area who could economically use the service.

New home building has also been an important factor in the more recent advances made in gas and electricity sales in the territory served by the Public Service company, according to Mr. Budd.



OUT WITH THE FRYING PAN...

If you are wont to think of ham and eggs as co-starring only in a skillet, you will have to change your mind this next recipe the of the window and the principals come

together in a bread tin. It is a cold meat pie, intended for luncheons or buffet suppers—an ex-cellent way to use the shank end of a Wilson's Certified Smoked Ham.

Cold Ham Pie

134 cups flour 34 cup Wilson's Certified Pure Lard 11/2 teaspoons salt 4 tablespoons cold water

4 cups Wilson's Smoked Ham, cooked 1 cup white sauce

teaspoon salt teaspoon dry mustard Few grains cayenne
4 Clear Brook eggs, beaten slightly
2 Clear Brook eggs, hard cooked

Sift flour with salt. Make pastry by cutting the lard into the flour until the mixture resembles coarse corn meal. Sprinkle on the cold water and

blend to make a soft dough. Form in a ball and chill. Put the ham through the food chop-per three times. Press with the back of a spoon until smooth. Combine with the white sauce, beaten eggs and seasonings. Line a medium-sized bread tin with pastry and fill with ham mixture. At intervals lay in hard-cooked eggs, cut in lengthwise wedges, and a few pistachio nuts, sliced stuffed olives

or strips of green pepper.



Cover with the pastry, decorate with a pastry rose and a few leaves, brush with melted Clear Brook butter. Bake in a hot oven (500° F.) for 10 minutes, then at 350° F. for 40 minutes more.

When cool enough, set in refrigerator to chill. Serve whole, garnished with spiced beets or squares of tomate aspic. Yields about 15 servings.
