Skokie Highway**


Three persons sustained injuries

**Jim McMillen to  
Battle Schnabel  
in Meet Friday**

The challenge of Hans Schnabel,  
German Oak and famed exponent  
of the dangerous back-breaker hold,  
has finally been accepted by Jim  
McMillen and the pair will meet in  
Peg's Grayslake arena... IF  
Schnabel can get by Jim's "policeman," Ruffy Silverstein, first. So  
Friday night, Hans and Ruffy will  
go to it in the main event of the  
regular weekly all-star card, and  
Schnabel will be battling for a return  
match with McMillen as the prize  
for a victory.  
It all came about three weeks ago  
when the powerful German bone  
bender and local here Jim battled  
tooth and nail in one of the roughest  
and most spectacular matches  
witnessed hereabouts in many a  
moon. The Teutonic strongman,  
who is built like a beer-barrel with  
muscles and boasts a 50 inch chest,  
19 inch biceps, and 20 inch neck, was  
the aggressor all the way, and after  
some forty minutes of hectic struggling  
had Jim just about out on his feet  
with a series of vicious back-breakers  
against the ring corner posts.  
As Schnabel crashed Jim into the  
corner like a battering ram, he lost  
his balance and Jim rebounded directly  
on top of him. Lou Gordon,  
erstwhile team-mate of McMillen at  
college, refereed and in a quick  
count saved the day for Jim giving  
him the match. Von Schacht,  
Schnabel's buddy and second jumped  
into the ring to help Schnabel protest  
and fists started to swing with  
half dozen police, a score of spectators,  
and officials milling around the  
ringside. Now Hans is hot for another  
chance at McMillen and has been  
promised one if he can best  
Ruffy.
