Mosquito District Offices to Move to Skokie Road Site

The North Shore Mosquito Abatement district whose office and equipment storage buildings have been on forest preserve property at 1853 Green Bay road, Glenocoe, since the district was organized in 1927, has purchased an acre of ground on the west side of Skokie boulevard, a short distance south of Winnetka avenue, where it is planned to erect an office building and a six-stall garage for the four trucks and other equipment.

The change is one which the district is being compelled to make, Superintendent A. H. Meier explained. The forest preserve, he said, is planning some development of that portion of the tract occupied at present by the Mosquito Abatement district, with the possible removal of the old buildings thereon.

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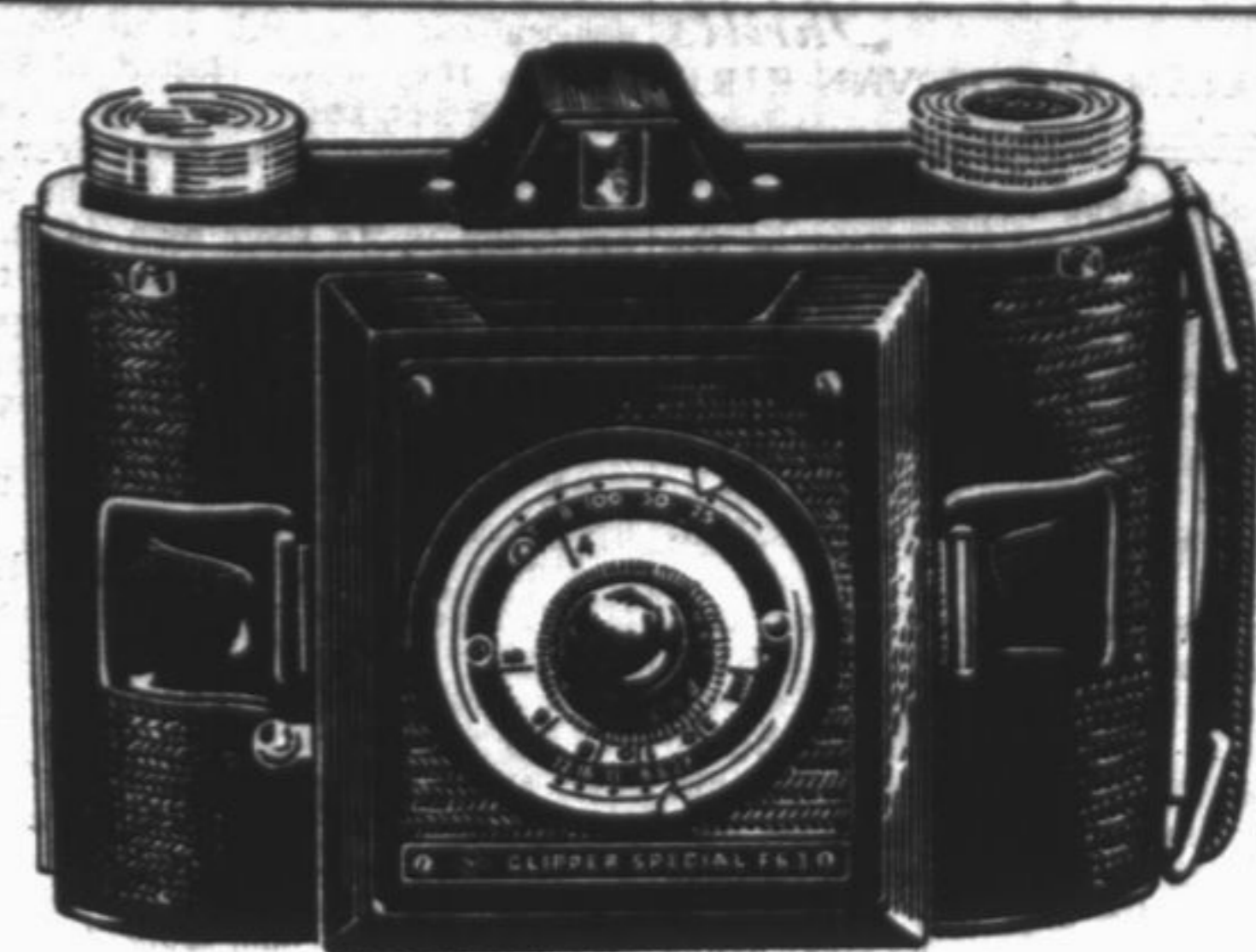
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Inklings from Neighboring Towns
