

Will Ask Injunction to Stop Enforcement of Labor Railway Act

On the 11th day of July, 1939, in a consolidated proceeding involving the status of the Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railroad Company under the Railway Labor Act and the Railroad Retirement Act, the Interstate Commerce Commission in a decision, which was not released until July 26, 1939, found that the North Shore is not a street, interurban or suburban electric railway within the meaning of the exemption provisions of the Railway Labor Act and the Railroad Retirement Act. The North Shore has at all times considered that it is an interurban electric railway and still so considers. It has been held to be an interurban electric railway by formal decree of the United States District Court for the Northern District of Illinois Eastern Division, and that decree was affirmed by the United States Supreme Court. The railroad has also been found by the Interstate Commerce Commission itself, in a proceeding instituted under the Railway Labor Act, to be a street, interurban or suburban electric railway exempt from the provisions of the Railway Labor Act.

The receiver, through his counsel, is serving notice upon all interested parties in the receivership proceedings this afternoon to the effect that the receiver will appear before Judge Holly, in the event Judge Wilkerson, who has the receivership proceedings in charge, is not at that time sitting, at which time the receiver, through counsel, will present a petition asking that an injunction issue restraining the United States District Attorney at Chicago from attempting to enforce any of the penalties prescribed by the Railway Labor Act for failure to comply with the provisions of that Act. This petition for injunction will involve a hearing to determine the legal status of the North Shore and will ask the Court to determine that the finding of the Interstate Commerce Commission is contrary to the facts and the law.

In the event that Judge Holly shall be unwilling to go into such hearing, the receiver's counsel will ask that the proceedings be set before Judge Wilkerson on the 25th day of September, 1939.

Civil Service Exam Open for Junior Public Health Nurse

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced an open competitive examination for the position of Junior Public Health Nurse, Department of the Interior. Applications must be on file in the Commission's office at Washington, D. C., not later than September 11 if received from states east of Colorado and not later than September 14, if received from Colorado and states westward. The salary for the position is \$1800 a year.

High school education and certain nursing training is required for entrance to the examination. Competitors are to be given a written test covering practical questions. Applicants must not have passed their fortieth birthday. The age limit will not be waived in any case.

The concert will open with the overture, "La Baruffe Chissotte" by Sinigaglia. This selection will be followed by Dohanny's Suite for Orchestra. Following Miss Rickman's first song, the orchestra under the baton of Mr. Goldberg, will play the Last Spring by Grieg and the Dance of the Buffoons from "The Snow Maiden" by Rimsky-Korsakoff. The program will close with Tchaikovsky's Capriccio Italien.

LIBRARY

The Library Institute

The University of Chicago Graduate Library School sponsored its fourth annual Institute for Librarian service with meetings July 31 through August 11th.
