quested evidence of obligations and resources and sign the necessary affidavits. 6. The applicant shall submit to reasonable examination and eligi-

bility, for relief will be determined solely upon the basis of need as prescribed in the Guide for Relief Con-The new forms for re-application

must be answered in detail. In addition to this a four page affidavit must be filled. Two additional copies of all affidavits are sent to the county and state offices to be filed and examined.

This is a state-wide order and all relief clients in Illinois are submitting to the new rules.
