Deerfield Making Drive Against Weeds

"Clean-Up Weeds Week" has been proclaimed by Governor Henry Horner, in a recent release from his State House office at Springfield designating Aug. 15 to 29 as the dates of the drive against weeds.

The proclamation said that concerted and specialized efforts are necessary to check and overcome the growth of noxious and troublesome weeds and it is urged that persons who own or have charge of real estate join the drive against weeds.

Homer G. Cazal, village trustee, is in charge of that work in Deerfield and wants all residents to heed the Governor's proclamation.

Relief Clients Must Reapply in Deerfield

Deerfield relief clients are to be cut off from relief the latter part of this month and will be required to reapply for assistance. In compliance with the recent regulations of the Illinois Emergency Relief commission that continued eligibility of all persons now receiving relief shall be determined by a re-examination of their needs and resources and their eligibility for other forms of public assistance, relief is discontinued in August.

Mrs. Robert E. Pettis, relief administrator, will receive from the state the new forms and affidavits for reapplication the latter part of this week, and each relief client will receive instructions in the mail, as to the procedure for re-examination and time of appointment.

Eligibility requirements for relief:

1. The applicant shall offer reasonable evidence that he has made an effort to obtain current employment, including evidence that he and all employable members of the relief group have registered or taken steps to register with the Illinois State Employment Service in Waukegan.

2. The applicant's income and resources shall represent less than 90 per cent of budgeted needs, as determined by the current budget of the local relief administration.

3. Relief shall not be granted to employable persons who refuse private or federal works employment or work-relief assignments.

4. The applicant shall present evidence that all members of the relief group who are eligible for Unemployment Compensation benefits have claimed such benefits.

5. The applicant shall provide requested evidence of obligations and resources and sign the necessary affidavits.

6. The applicant shall submit to reasonable examination and eligibility, for relief will be determined solely upon the basis of need as prescribed in the Guide for Relief Control.

The new forms for re-application must be answered in detail. In addition to this a four page affidavit must be filled. Two additional copies of all affidavits are sent to the county and state offices to be filed and examined.

This is a state-wide order and all relief clients in Illinois are submitting to the new rules.

Deerfield Firemen to Help Sponsor Deerfield Days

The Deerfield Volunteer Fire department is co-operating with the village of Deerfield in the sponsoring of the three-day carnival "Deerfield Days" on Saturday, Sunday and Labor Day, September 2, 3 and 4. The Fire department will receive a certain percentage of the net proceeds to put into their fund for the purchase of a much needed new fire truck. The remainder of the proceeds will go into the treasury of the village to help pay off old debts.

The outside concessions will be the tilt-a-whirl, ferris wheel, merry-go-round and the African dip. The registration booth will have donations for gifts, and the prizes for the bingo games will be useful and good merchandise. There will be many more added attractions and plenty of refreshments.

The streets at the intersection of Waukegan road and Osterman Ave. at the entrance to the carnival grounds are to be better lighted and the police who handle traffic will have illuminated night-sticks.

A four-door Packard sedan, purchased from a local garage, is to be the main prize of the carnival. All organizations are volunteering to assist on the various committees to help make "Deerfield Days" a success.
