All the colors of the rainbow can be found on the boxes. Addresses, prices, coupons, crests of institutions, information of all sorts, are plastered over the match containers, making the hobby a never-ending feast of interest.

He started this train of collecting when he emptied his suitcase of a dozen boxes once, each of a special variety. Now, for pure amusement and "killing time," he occupies spare moments garnering new sources that may yield a different match array. He is on the road about every other week.
