

### Inklings from Neighboring Towns

One need not travel great distances to see the southern flowers, because some of them are blooming in the garden of a Grayslake resident.

When Mrs. Lehr came home from Florida last spring, she brought bulbs and cuttings of some of the flowers of which Florida people are justly proud. At present the Florida four o'clocks and the St. Peter's bells are in bloom, and everyone is invited to go to the nursery and see them.

No Man's Land, the unincorporated tract along Lake Michigan between Wilmette and Kenilworth, will become a part of Wilmette on Monday, August 28.

The action was taken Tuesday evening when the Wilmette village board passed an ordinance of annexation to become effective on the day the village files a copy of the ordinance and a plat of the territory in the office of the county recorder of deeds. This is scheduled to take place on the 28th, ten days after public notice is given.

Legislation permitting the annexation by action of the village board without reference to the inhabitants of No Man's Land was passed recently by the state assembly and signed by Governor Henry Horner.

The Harry Stratton farm of 80 acres, located about 2 miles southwest of Lake Villa, has been sold by Louis I. Behm, to Peter Adler of Chicago. The purchaser is a brother to Nicholas Adler, present owner of what is known as the old Mort Kaple farm.

Mr. Adler will take possession next March, and will reside on the place.

Two Guernsey cows owned by Albert A. Creaves of Wauconda township have just finished new official records for production which entitles them to entry in the Advanced Register of the American Guernsey Cattle club. These animals include three year old Bonny Lass of Thorn Hill 424559 producing 10771.6 pounds of milk and 545.5 pounds of butter fat in class E, and two year old Joy Belle of Creaves Farm 480174 producing 8493.5 pounds of milk and 361.8 pounds of butter fat in class GGG.

David Frankel, of Winnetka, who took his first aid work while in charge of Boy Scout Troop 19 at Community House, in that city, is credited with saving the lives of at least one person and possibly two others in a traffic accident at Wheeler, Ind., August 6. His brother, Donald, also was commended for his assistance.

The two administered treatment to the patients for nearly an hour, before they were taken to a hospital in Gary. David Frankel, field commissioner in first aid for the Indian-

apolis Boy Scout council, and a Red Cross first aid instructor, stopped severe bleeding from injuries of the three victims and gave emergency treatment to two others less badly hurt.

Ivan S. Glidewell, first aid director of the Indianapolis Red Cross chapter, officially commended him, asserting his efforts prevented the crash victims from bleeding to death. Those injured are residents of Wheeler and Gary.

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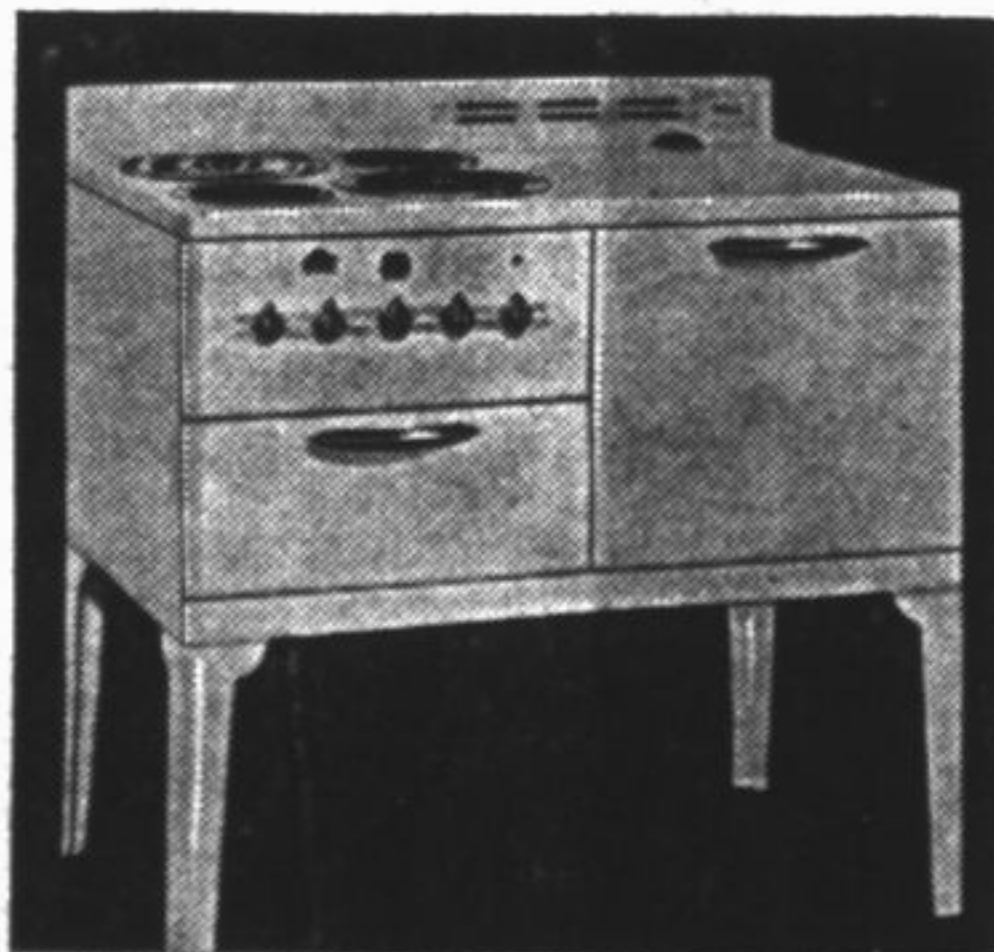
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
