

300 Republicans In Rally Sunday At Leverone Estate

There were 300 Republicans who took over the estate of L. E. Leverone at Deerfield on Sunday, Aug. 27, in joyous and enthusiastic anticipation of the 1940 elections.

Many distinguished Republican leaders attended this event which was arranged and sponsored by the Lake County Federation of Young Republicans. Richard J. Lyons, of Libertyville, candidate for governor, headed the honored guests. Dwight H. Green, of Chicago, another gubernatorial possibility, paid a brief visit, as did J. Paul Kuhn, of Batavia, former Republican candidate for governor, Jack Morrow, former member of the National Republican Committee, and William M. Marks, chairman of the Lake County Republican Central Committee, were a few of the many leading Republicans present. Young Republican leaders of national prominence included Thomas J. Downs, vice-chairman of the Young Republican National Federation, James P. Economos, chairman of the Cook County Young Republican organization, Edward Alexander, of Jacksonville, chairman of the Board of Governors of the Young Republican organization of Illinois, Joseph N. Sikes, of Grayslake, secretary of the State organization, and Richard Nowinson, editor of the Young Republican Magazine.

Robert McClory of Lake Bluff, chairman of the Lake County Federation of Young Republicans, was in general charge of the picnic and was ably assisted by Hugo Schneider, Jr., Mrs. Ray Simmers and Mrs. Grace Jacobsen, all of Highland Park. The latter is secretary of the county organization.

Popular among the many activities were softball, ping pong, swimming, horseshoes, and an egg throwing contest which brought loud cheers and laughter from the large crowd. The gate prize was won by Tom Birmingham of Lake Forest.

Mr. Leverone took personal charge of preparing and serving steak dinners to the guests in attendance. The steaks being supplemented by corn on the cob and a variety of fresh vegetables and fruits from Mr. Leverone's own gardens. During Mr. Leverone's leisure moments, he pointing out the many and varied points of beauty and interest on the 140 acres comprising his beautiful estate. The crowd tarried long after dark and when a huge bonfire was lighted, the scene echoed with the vocal strains of familiar tunes.

U. S. Civil Service Commission Holds Competitive Exams

Junior Custodian Officer, \$1,860 a year, Bureau of Prisons.—This examination offers young men and women interested in social and penal problems an opportunity to make correctional work a career in the prison service. Accordingly persons with the aptitude for this work and with the educational qualifications in keeping with the Government's promotional plan are desired. A mental test will be given to measure applicants' fitness and their aptitude for prison work. Applicants must have completed a four-year high school course, or 14 units of high school study, but special credit will be given for certain college study. The physical requirements are rigid. Applicants must have reached their twenty-fifth but must not have passed their forty-fifth birthday. Applications for this position must be filed with the Civil Service Commission at Washington, D. C., not later than September 18, if received from states east of Colorado, and not later than September 21, 1939, if received from Colorado and states westward.

Chief Budget Examiner, \$6,500 a year, and Principal Budget Examiner, \$5,600 a year, for employment in the executive office of the president, Bureau of the Budget.—These examinations are to secure high grade specialists for government budget work. Experience of a highly responsible nature, including progressively responsible experience in the management or financial control of governmental or large industrial, commercial, or other non-public organizations, is required, except for partial substitution or specified college study. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-fifth birthday. The closing dates for receipt of applications are September 12 for states east of Colorado, and September 15, 1939, for Colorado and states westward.

Inspector of Hats, Inspector of Miscellaneous Supplies (hosiery and knit underwear), Inspector of Textiles, and Inspector of Clothing, all at a salary of \$2,000 a year; Junior Inspector of Textiles, and Junior Inspector of Clothing, \$1,620 a year.—Examinations are announced for these positions in the Quartermaster Corps of the War Department, employment at Quartermaster Depot, Philadelphia, Pa. Applicants must not have passed their fifty-fifth birthday. For the junior inspector positions they must have reached their twenty-first birthday, and for the other positions they must have reached their twenty-fifth birthday. The closing dates for receipt of applications are September 25 for states east of Colorado, and

September 28, 1939, for Colorado and states westward.

Full information may be obtained from Raymond F. Seiffert, secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board of Examiners, at the post office in this city, or from the secretary of the U. S. Civil Service Board of Examiners at any first- or second-class post office.
