**District 107**

The Elm Place and Greenbay Road schools will open at 9 o'clock on Wednesday morning, September 6. All children who were in school last year should report to the home rooms to which they were assigned at the close of school. Kindergarten pupils should report to the kindergarten teachers, Miss Deile at Elm Place, and Miss Stark at the Greenbay Road school. New kindergarten pupils must be five years of age before January 1. Birth certificates should be brought to school when kindergarten children register. All other new pupils should register at the office of the principal of the school which they will attend. The boundaries of School District 107 are approximately as follows: Ravine drive and Deerfield avenue on the south; Ridge road from Deerfield avenue to West Park avenue on the west, also Exmoor avenue and Lakeview avenue north of West Park on the west; on the north, West Park avenue from Ridge road to Exmoor and Walker avenue from Lakeview avenue to the lake. Children must reside in the district in order to attend the Elm Place or Greenbay Road school without the payment of tuition. Children in kindergarten through third grade living west of the railroad tracks attend Greenbay Road school. Primary grade children living east of the railroad tracks attend Elm Place school. All children in the district from fourth through eighth grades attend Elm Place.

Textbooks will be for sale in the Elementary building of the Elm Place school from 9 until 12 and from 1 until 4 o'clock on Tuesday, September 5. Books bought by the children should be purchased at that time. First grade children at Greenbay Road school will get their books from their teachers during the first few days of school. All other children should buy their books at the bookstore. Relatively few changes have been

made in the teaching staff of the two schools. Miss Marjorie Lynch of the Greenbay Road school has resigned. Mrs. Barbara Zimmerman has been transferred from Elm Place to teach second grade and music at Greenbay Road. Miss Jeanne King will take Mrs. Zimmerman's place at Elm Place.

Miss King is a graduate of Hastings college in Hastings, Neb. She has also had a year of very practical graduate training in modern primary methods at the National College of Education in Evanston. In addition to her fine primary teacher training, Miss King is an accomplished musician, having studied piano at the Hastings College Conservatory of Music and at the American Conservatory of Music in Chicago. She should be a distinct addition to the school faculty and to the community.

Mr. Joe Nash, well-known artist of Lake Forest, will spend some time supervising the teaching of Art in the schools. The buildings and grounds of both the Elm Place and Greenbay Road schools have been put in excellent condition for the opening of school. The Primary building of the Elm Place school has been completely redecorated in attractive colors. A new celotex ceiling has been installed in the kindergarten. A convenient and safe stairway has been built to connect the Primary and Intermediate buildings.

Parents are urged to have their children ready for school on its opening day. These first days are just as important as any others in the school year.

**North Shore Line To Spend \$89,460 To Modernize Cars**

(Continued from Page 1) will provide a fixture located in the headlining over the center of each seat. This "bull's eye" will give an illumination of approximately three times the present system on the reading plane.

The bucket type seats on the Chicago-Milwaukee cars will be replaced by modern tubular-framed walkover type seats, upholstered in mohair plush of attractive colors. Seats on the Chicago-Waukegan trains will be rebuilt and attractively covered. The new floor covering will be of rubber of pleasing design.

The inside of the cars will be unique, the floor covering, seat upholstery and painting being designed by a leading interior decorator. Each five cars will have a different decorative scheme. The exterior of the cars will be painted the new bluish-green recently adopted by the railroad.

"The North Shore Line in years past has always led the way in innovations and new equipment and we believe these modernized cars will not only provide greater travel comfort but will attract wide attention and bring increased use of the service," Bernard J. Fallon, executive officer for the receiver, said. "While the ventilating, heating and lighting systems will be the last word in engineering, we believe the seats, upholstering and interior decoration are extraordinary. In planning the interior of the cars, we have had the advice not only of a noted interior decorator, but of many women and it was their verdict that primarily led us into our choices of colors and upholstering. The women were largely interested in colors and upholstering material they would select for their own homes and as a result there will be five entirely different color schemes in the twenty-five cars, and I might say, all of them excellent."
