Chicago, Sept. 7 .- Announcement has been made by Mr. R. L. Williams, chief executive officer of the Chicago & North Western Railway, that effective last Saturday the North Western Limited, through train between Chicago and Minneapolis, will be operated daily with Diesel electric power, both north and southbound.




