

H.S. Football Teams Open Season With Hinsdale, Saturday

After an intensive training period the Highland Park High School football teams will open the season on their home field this Saturday.

The coaching staff has been working hard for the past few weeks and declare that the teams are ready for action.

Freshmen prospects who look good include Pertz, an end; Scapitan and Sessa, tackles; Athanus, a guard; Pesola, Murphy and Flinn, halfbacks; and Salyards and A. Baracani.

In spite of the recent hot weather both teams have been working hard and while there are no individual stars they are well rounded aggregations. Sporting their new uniforms consisting of blue pants, white jerseys and tan helmets, they are going to fight hard for victory in their initial game on Saturday.
