The Earl Said a Mouthful

When the Earl of Sandwich demanded a slab of meat between two slices of bread, he laid down the specifications for what has been standard equipment for portable meals ever since.

As a change for the school lunch box I suggest a sort of inside-out sandwich, not exactly a piece of bread between two slices of ham but any one of a number of interesting fillings between two slices of ham.

A BREADLESS HAMWICH

Buy a whole or half Tender Made Ham in the yellow wrapper. It is ready to serve as you buy it. Cut two firm slices for your Hamwich, about 1/4 inch thick.

One treatment is to spread the slices lightly with mustard, apply a filling of chopped olives or other relish, and cut the "hamwich" in fingers for easy eating.

A bun, roll or muffin as part-of the lunch makes a change from the usual parallel slices of bread.




Bringing Home the Bacon
