"Matter" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, September 17.

The Golden Text was, "My flesh and my heart falleth: but God is the strength of my heart, and my portion forever" (Psalms 73:26).

Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "Love not the world, neither the things that are in the world. If any man love the world, the love of the Father is not in him. For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world. And the world passeth away, and the lust thereof: but he that doeth the will of God abideth for ever" (1 John 2:15-17).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "So-called material existence affords no evidence of spiritual existence and immortality. . . . Matter is not the vestibule of Spirit. Jesus reasoned on this subject practically. . . . Understanding the nothingness of material things, he spoke of flesh and Spirit as the two opposites,—no error and Truth, not contributing in any way to each other's happiness and existence. Jesus knew, "It is the spirit that quickeneth; the flesh profiteth nothing" (p. 356).

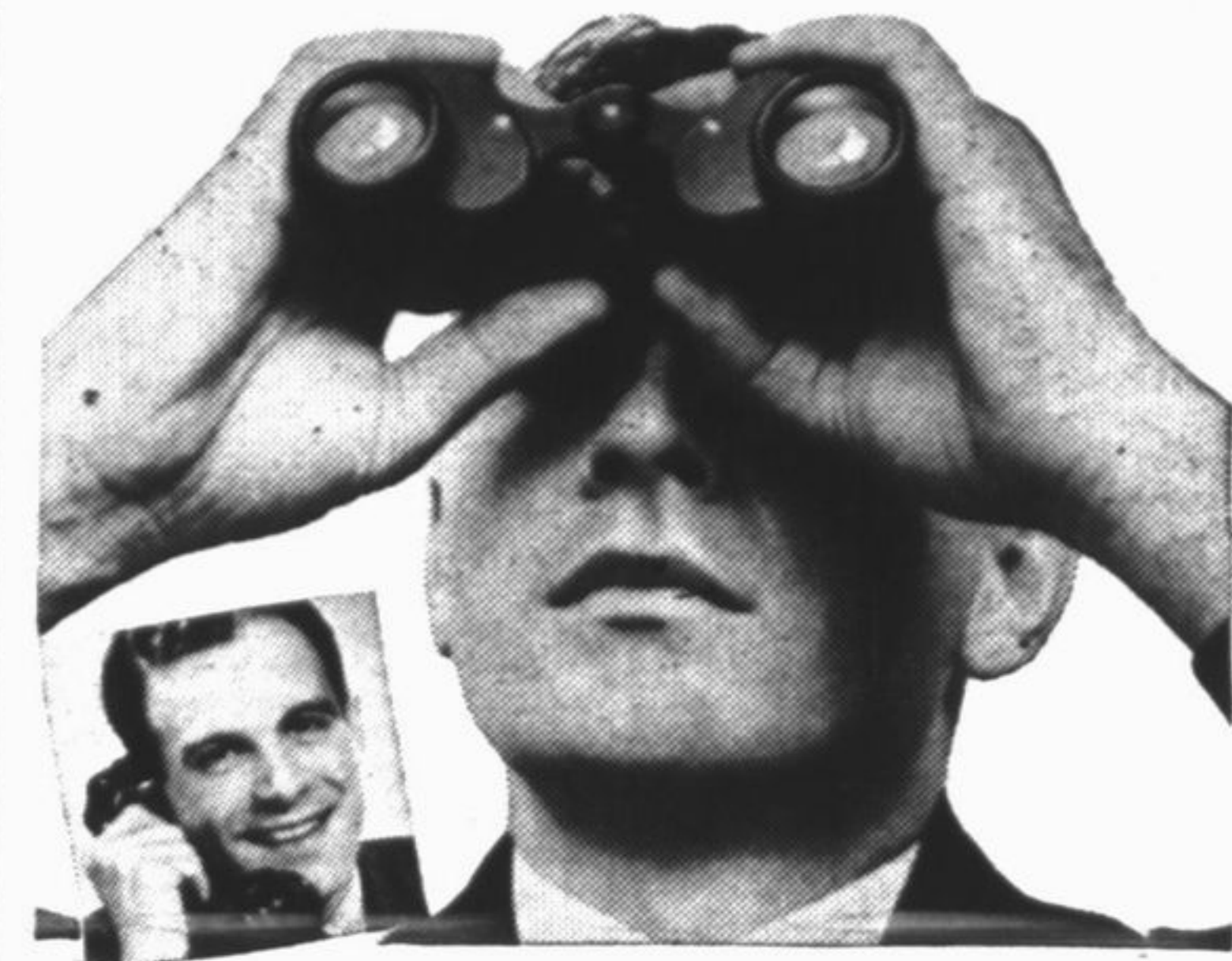
Mothers Club Opens Season with Dinner

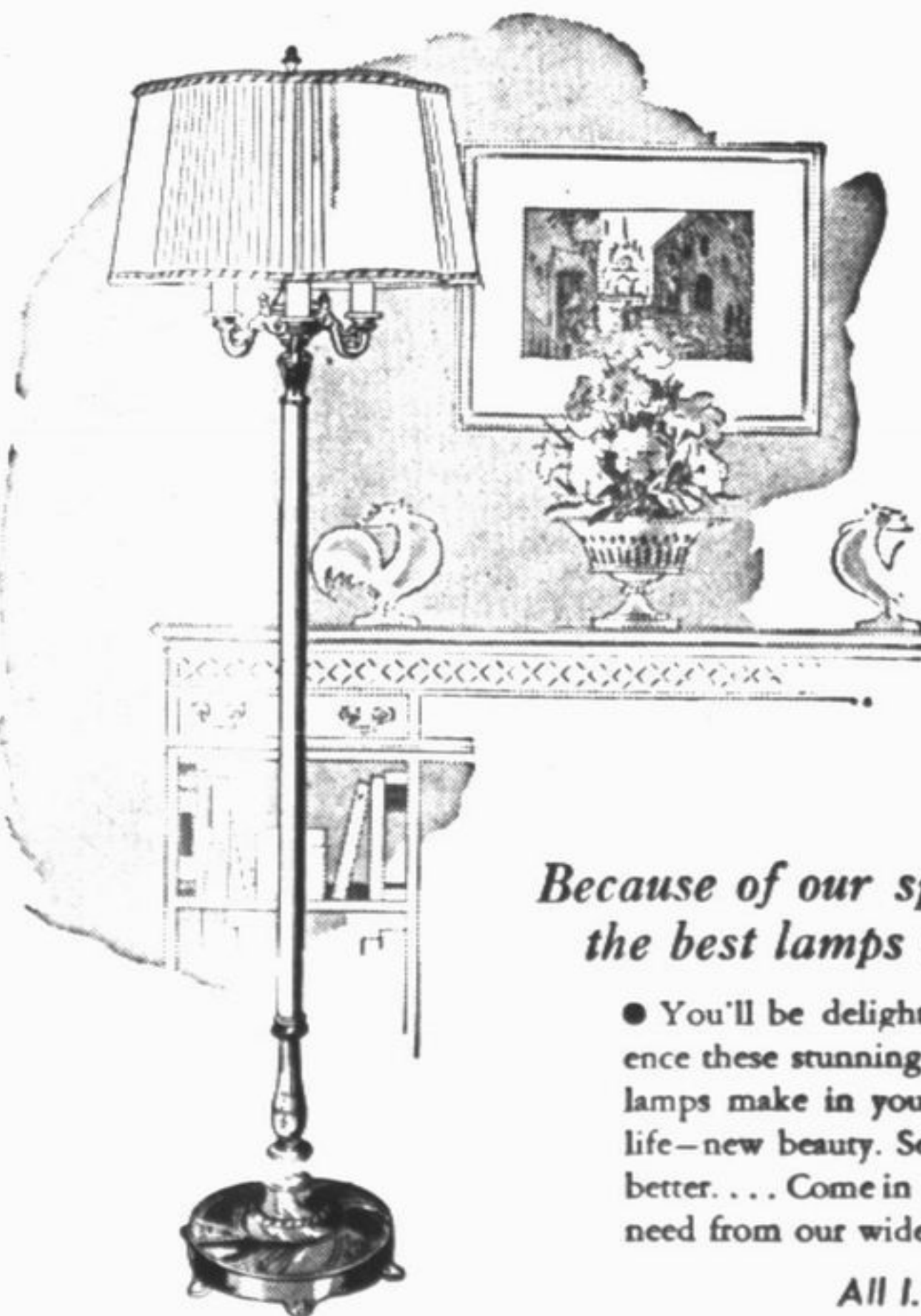

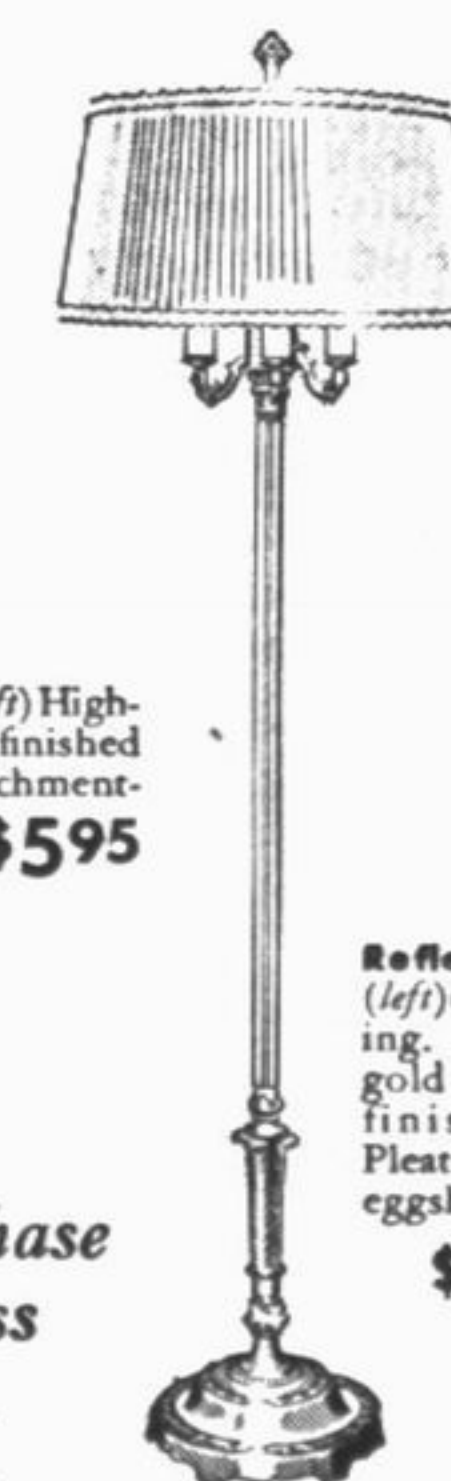

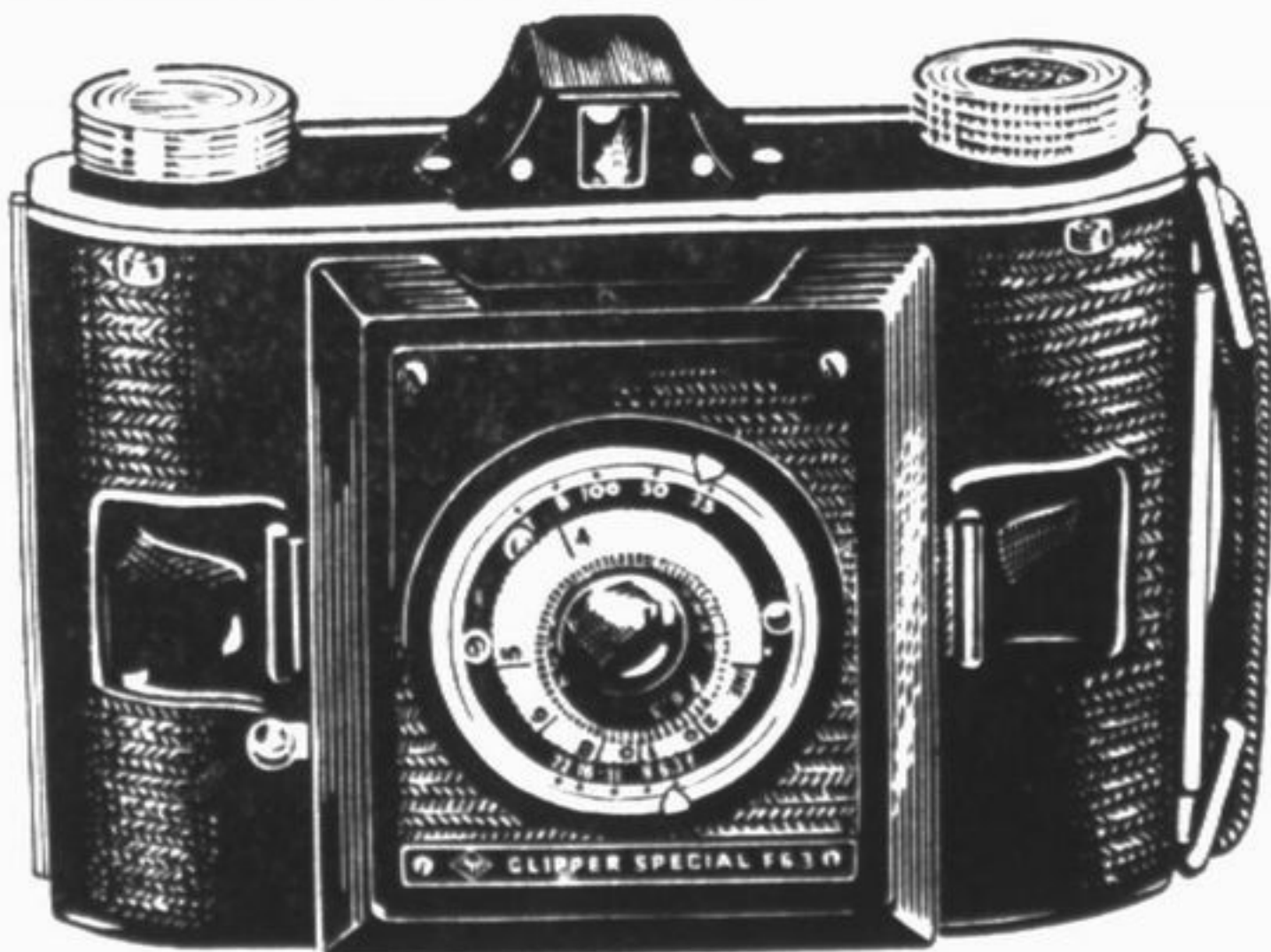
