BICYCLING TO SCHOOL? WATCH THESE HAZARDS Thousands of children, making daily bicycle trips to and from school, face the grave risk of becoming involved in a serious collision with a motor vehicle, warns the Illinois Automobile club.

Since youngsters must ride their bicycles on the roadwayno other place being provided—the only immediate method of decreasing accidents is to know the most prominent causes of bicycle-automobile collisions and warn the children against them.

According to a recent club study, the following items account for a majority of such accidents: (1) failure of the cyclist to obey a traffic sign; (2) failure to give a hand signal when turning; (3) failure to keep on the right side of the road near the curb; (4) riding four or five abreast; (5) carrying some one on the handlebars; (6) failure to have head and tail light at night, and (7) hitching to another vehicle.

Correct these faults and avoid serious accidents!


