Calling all stamp collectors and those who are interested in this hobby!

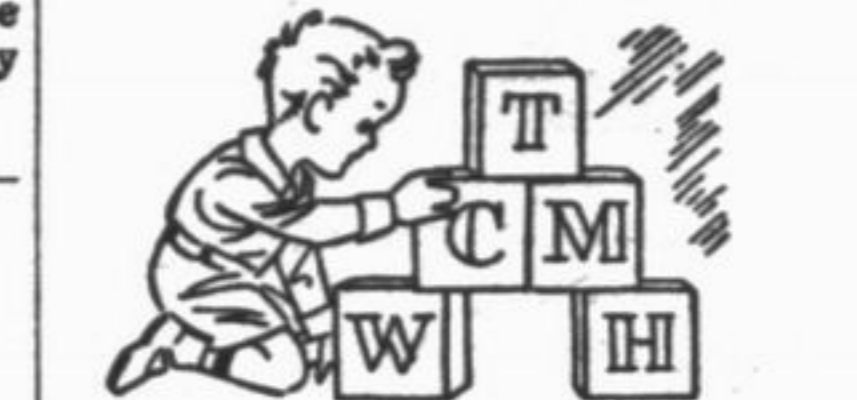

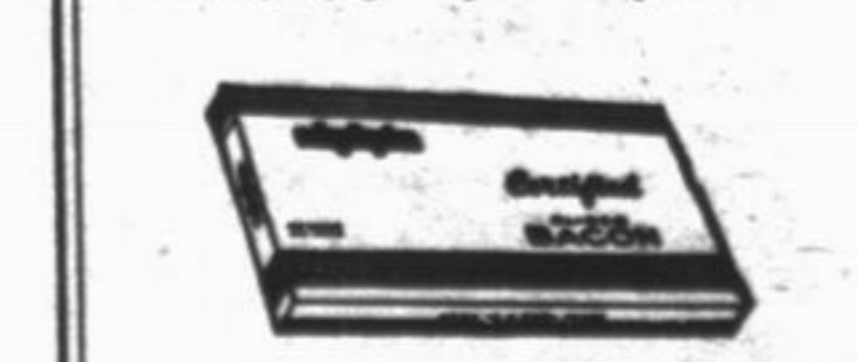
Tender Made Ham in Maple Syrup

Since Tender Made Ham is already cooked and so tender it can be cut with a fork, a baked ham requires only a short trip to the oven for heating and glazing. Have the ham at room temperature. Place it in an open roaster, add one cup of water or fruit juice and cook in a moderate oven (350° F.) for 5 minutes to the pound. Add extra liquid if needed. When heating time is up, remove from oven, take off skin, score fat and stud with large, fat cloves. Pour 1 cup pure maple syrup over the surface and return to oven. Baste frequently until it is a rich brown all over the top.

Any Sunday afternoon stroll will reveal such widely assorted couples that you wonder how the two ever came together. The same situation can also be found in the culinary world.
